A major component of the planning and consensus building process was public involvement and input. In addition to a Public Opinion Survey, three different venues were utilized during the master planning process. These included Stakeholder Interviews, Public Workshop #1 and Public Workshop #2. The final Master Plan was also presented to a joint meeting of the Board of Alderman and Park and recreation Commission, which the public was invited to attend on March 27, 2007. PROS Consulting also completed a two day recreational programming and organization review with staff and City representatives. This Appendix includes summaries from the first two events.

Comments received after Public Workshop #2, were reviewed and considered by the Working Committee and incorporated into the final plan where deemed appropriate.

Ice Rink Groups

1 What existing features within the Clayton Park System are positive elements?

Staff is very easy to work with.

Public skating hours are well balanced against group rental hours.

2 What existing features within the Clayton Park System are negative elements?

Sometime staff didn't show up. This has not happened recently.

Zamboni is not very reliable, and breaks down often.

Parking and drop-off is a big problem, especially since metered parking spaces along Brentwood Blvd. have been removed.

Length of outdoor skating season seems to be getting shorter each year.

3 What are your top priorities for improving the Clayton Parks and Recreation System?

Run the rink as a business.

4 Identify the top three parks within the Clayton Park system that you use and what improvements would you like to see made to them?

Shaw Park

5 What could be done to better meet your recreation needs?

Keep the rink the way it is. It's the last outdoor rink in the area.

6 Miscellaneous

Good place for recreational skater, or beginner.

Rink only has basic changing facilities. It is what it is.

Rink is mostly utilized with some open time still available.

Rink is used by hockey organizations for practice only. Not suited for official games.

Rinks character is its strength. Many people have great memories of using the facility in the past.

Typical rink hours are 7 am-11 pm, mostly used from noon-11 pm.

Maintenance is good at both the indoor and outdoor facilities.

Parking is not a problem early in the morning, but it is a problem when meets are held in the early evening such as at 5:30 pm.
Not enough pool water, especially organized time.

3 What are your top priorities for improving the Clayton Parks and Recreation System?

Would like to see an appreciation for the diversity of interests people have, and an effort to work together and be supportive of each other.

4 Identify the top three parks within the Clayton Park system that you use and what improvements would you like to see made to them:

Shaw Park

5 What could be done to better meet your recreation needs?

Heater in Shaw Park Pool would expand season on both ends. May 1 till October 1.
Need lane lines on the bottom of the dive tank.

6 Miscellaneous

CSP has approximately 400 members, and includes 17 coaches.

Season is 12 months long, and occurs both indoors and outdoors.

Biggest conflict times are after school in the winter due to high school swim teams.

CSP utilizes the following facilities: Shaw Park Pool, Maplewood Pool, MICDS, Westminster Christian Academy, Ladue High School, and the Center of Clayton.

Water time for CSP is broken down in the following ways: Training, Competitions, and Summer League.

Summer League includes training and several small meets at both Maplewood Pool and Shaw Park Pool.

CSP sponsored competitive events include: December Meet (1 day @ the Center:5-12 yr olds) and June Meet (3 days @ Shaw Park:5 yr olds-College age).
5:30 am is prime time for swim training.

Program was a program part of the Clayton Parks and Rec Department until it became a club in 1980.

CSP includes 4 yr olds through adult masters programs.

Cost of program pays for 75% of coaches time plus rental for water time.

Tennis Clubs

1 What existing features within the Clayton Park System are positive elements?

- Staff is very cooperative and supportive.
- Staff attitude is a shining light in the Clayton Park System.
- Courts kept open all year whenever possible.
- Attendants nice, but sometimes seem passive.

2 What existing features within the Clayton Park System are negative elements?

- Courts were poorly rehabbed. Should have been done better. Already showing cracks.
- No convenient backboard without disrupting play.
- Lighting is too low. Lighting is blinding when playing lob shots.

Parking and access is difficult at night. Often users have to walk through the park at night to get to courts.

3 What are your top priorities for improving the Clayton Parks and Recreation System?

- Add shade around courts. Trees which provided shade have been removed.

Continue to serve senior tennis clubs, and not eliminate them or force them out.

- 2-3 pros are associated with the tennis center for lessons.

Gateway tennis contracts and pays for court time at the Clayton Tennis Center.

- Time clock for part time employees. Timesheets currently require more effort than necessary.

Fields 1,2,5 and 6 are used for softball play.

Field 5 is especially popular because of "reachable" fence. Would like a "reachable" fence for Field #6.

Players would like "round robin" tournament at the end of the season.

Fields dry moderately well.

Many times park maintenance crew does not work on the fields, Rec staff does.

No softball is scheduled on the High School Field.

Sharing w/ High School causes conflicts.

Conflicts especially with tennis due to fact that some courts must remain open for public use.

Ice rink is a waste. Why do we have it? It is only used for a very short time in the winter. Facility should be used year round for something.

Parking is inadequate. Sometimes parking is unavailable.

Difficult to drop equipment/balls at tennis center.

Drop off/turn around for kids is needed.

JazzFest damages fields during the summer, and fields never recover for fall season. By mid fall, fields are always wet and muddy. Field #7 often has standing water.

3 What are your top priorities for improving the Clayton Parks and Recreation System?

Need to determine who has priority on certain facilities at specific times.

Tennis courts need to be resurfaced. They do not drain, and will not dry. Forest Park courts should be the standard for court renovations in Clayton.

Remove trees which overhang the courts.

Circulation does not work around the Tennis Center. No way to bring ball carts directly out to courts without going over steps.

Gate at Shaw Park Drive has been locked which makes unloading at the Tennis Center difficult.

High School teams have a high rate of participation due to no cut policy, all courts and fields need to be dedicated at certain times to accommodate school age users.

Soccer:3 boys teams use fields in Shaw Park, 4 girls teams use fields at Gay. Need 1/2 a field per team.

Want to make sure improvements to fields will last longer.

When planning improvements, don't do it "on the cheap", do it right the first time.

Sometimes coaches and parents have had to make repairs on the fields themselves.
