

News from Ward I

We are delighted to have the opportunity to communicate with Clayton residents about news from Ward 1, the area east of Big Bend that is characterized by historic neighborhoods and stellar institutions...

- Fontbonne University is completing renovations to establish a new teaching Center in Communication Disorders, Deaf Education and Education/Special Education, which are nationally recognized programs and services.
- Washington University was approved for a new residence hall as part of a long-term plan to replace aging dormitories. The four-story, 163-bed building furthers the University's state-of-the-art, on-campus housing.

- Concordia Seminary has a new monument sign at Clayton Road and University Lane, and the campus grounds look outstanding. Discussions are underway for possible use of the former CBC athletic field for Clayton High School evening football games.
- Wydown School has "green" barrier fencing on the south side of the parking lot, thanks to the School District's
 responsiveness to neighbor requests. We are encouraging examination of rental programs to be more
 accommodating to neighbors.
- Wilson School will begin construction for an "underground" gymnasium and additional school renovations, without impinging upon its residential property to the east on Fauquier.
- St. Michael and St. George School is expanding and enhancing its playground for elementary students, also providing greater safety.
- Captain School has launched its "Roots and Shoots" playground renovation, converting a section of asphalt into an attractive organic garden for multiple learning opportunities. Teachers, parents, students and alums are fundraising, and naming bricks are still available.
- Cornerstone development proposed for the corner of Clayton Road and University is currently on hold. We
 have been actively working with residents and the developer to ensure that the development fits within the
 context of the neighborhood. We are also pursuing an Urban Design District for Clayton Road, a tool used
 for areas experiencing transition or development pressure.

The City provides excellent services in Ward 1. From microsurfacing streets and rebuilding alleys to landscaping medians and Alamo Park; from snow-plowing to street-sweeping; from tree-trimming to globe-light cleaning; our Public Works Department maintains Clayton's high standards. The City is currently working with MSD to address storm water concerns.

Safety is always a top concern. The Clayton Police Department has initiated heightened surveillance in response to auto thefts in the DeMun area and is investigating improved lighting to discourage illegal activity. Recently, a house on Wydown experienced a significant fire, and the Clayton Fire Department responded quickly and effectively.

Walgreen's is scheduled to reopen in December 2004. Clayton Road also features the newly transformed Blackberry Cafe. The DeMun retail strip is thriving with Kaldi's, Jimmy's, Sasha's, Gallery DeMun, Joint Venture Antiques, The Healing Center, Heads and Strand...as well as Hughes Antiquarian Books, Bouffant Daddy and Carl's Deli on the south end.

We are honored to represent such a diverse and vibrant section of Clayton. With the flurry of reinvestment in the area, extending to the sensational Forest Park, it is certainly an exciting time. While one issue may be in our spotlight, we follow many ongoing concerns, such as MetroLink's progress, economic development in the Central Business District, fiscal responsibility and future planning for the City.

On April 1st, the dispatch function for the Clayton Police and Fire Departments was transferred to the East Central Dispatch Center in Richmond Heights. 

Landscape Master Plan

The role of the Landscape Committee is to counsel the Board of Aldermen on matters relating to landscaping and beautification of City parks, rights-of-way and other public spaces. In late 2003, the Committee issued a Request for Qualifications for planning and design services to develop a comprehensive public space Landscape Master Plan. SWT Associates was selected to submit a planning and design services proposal. To ensure that the needs and desires of the community were addressed, an interactive planning process was used during the development of the comprehensive plan. The design team collected and analyzed information and developed the final design, engaging City staff and the Clayton Landscape Committee



throughout the design process. The Comprehensive Landscape Master Plan was developed to provide a solid foundation to guide the City's future landscape improvements. The plan identified areas of immediate attention and explored the groundwork necessary for future streetscape improvement.

Thirty Years on the Job

On May 22, 2004, the Missouri Chapter of the American Public Works Association's St. Louis Metro Branch held its annual dinner and awards banquet. Three of Clayton's Public Works Department employees were recognized for outstanding service to the City. Gary Scheipeter, Public Works Superintendent, Doug Durham, the City

Forester and Dale Miner, Labor Foreman, each have worked for thirty consecutive years for the City's Public Works Department. "We are proud to have these conscientious individuals on staff," said Public Works Director Dave Christensen. "The City of Clayton is a fine place in which to live and work because of hard working employees like Gary, Doug and Dale."

Microsurfacing

Recently, the Board of Aldermen approved a contract with Missouri Petroleum, Inc. to apply a microsurfacing pavement to streets in residential subdivisions and the central business district. The material used in this project has proven to be very effective in reducing the amount of repairs needed to maintain pavement.

In residential areas, temporary street closures will be needed to ensure the quality of this undertaking. One week prior to the start of the project, signage will be placed at subdivision entrances with additional information about the project.

In the central business district (CBD), temporary street and alley closures will occur; and access to driveways and parking lots will temporarily be limited. To minimize inconvenience and traffic disruptions, all overlay operations will be performed during the day on Saturdays and Sundays. Since the process requires a double application in the CBD, this work will take place on one day during two weekends. Signage with additional information will be placed along streets two to three days before the start of the project.

Traffic will be allowed to travel on the newly paved streets within three to four hours after the microsurfacing application is complete. Citizens are asked to observe the "No Parking" and traffic control signs which will be posted just prior to and during the resurfacing project. The contractor will send a notification letter approximately one week prior to the start of the project.

Taste of Clayton Restaurants Win Environmental Awards



The **Ecology** Environmental Awareness Committee (EEAC) promotes ecologically sound practices within the Clayton community. To encourage earth-friendly practices at special events, the Committee met with Taste of Clayton, St. Louis Jazz Festival and Saint Louis Art Fair event coordinators and discussed ways to minimize the impact on the environment.

Clayton coordinators selected recycled paper stock for all of the event's printed pieces. They also worked with EEAC members on a project in which restaurateurs received surveys asking them to furnish information about their environmentally friendly practices. The Committee tallied the survey results and announced that Bevo Mill/Max's, J. Buck's and Kaldi's were winners for their "green" efforts at the 2004 Taste of Clayton. On June 22, first place winner David Hanon accepted a proclamation from the Board of Aldermen recognizing the restaurateur's efforts in minimizing environmental impact and conserving precious natural resources during their participation at the Taste of Clayton.

Representatives with the Taste of Clayton are considering other ways to protect the environment at the 2005 event.



Mosquito Control and West Nile Virus

Citizens are urged to help reduce the mosquito population.

Mosquito control has been an important public health issue in St. Louis County for many years. However, with the arrival of West Nile Virus (WNV), the County's Vector Control Program provides ways to target the areas with the greatest potential for the disease.

Since prevention is very important in mosquito control, treatment of mosquito breeding sites is a high priority. The St. Louis County Vector Control Program addresses mosquito problems in public areas but not private property. Since mosquitoes can breed anywhere that water collects, residents and businesses should also take preventive measures.

Vector Control welcomes citizen input regarding areas of high mosquito infestation to aid in its surveillance program and in determining the presence of mosquito borne diseases, including WNV.

Actions citizens can take:

Landscaping:

- Make sure drainpipes from gutters and sump pumps are properly sloped so they do not hold water.
- Never dump grass clippings or leaves into creeks or other drainage areas.
- Keep bushes trimmed and grass cut.
- Fill in any low places where water can stand.
- Keep fish in fishponds, as they eat mosquito larvae.

Home Maintenance:

- Check and clean out clogged rain gutters and downspouts.
- Store inside, or get rid of, artificial containers such as flowerpots, cans, tires, etc.
- Empty, clean and refill birdbaths on a weekly basis.
- Empty and clean small wading pools at least once a week.
- Be sure pool covers are not holding water and breeding mosquitoes.
- Store wheelbarrows upside down; cover or store canoes and boats upside down.

Personal Protection:

- Wear light colored clothing (white is best) and a white hat, as mosquitoes are attracted to dark colors.
- Wear long sleeves and long pants to minimize exposed skin.
- Check out mosquito repellent products and follow label instructions.
- A fan creates a breeze which prevents mosquitoes from landing.

Homeowners can purchase biological mosquito control products at garden centers, hardware and home supply stores and on the Internet. For information about products used by the County's Vector Services visit www.ci.clayton.mo.us, click City Departments, Public Works, then West Nile virus.

Second Annual Safety Day

The Clayton Police and Fire Departments are sponsoring the second Annual Safety Day, which will be held at The Center of Clayton on August 14, 2004 between 10:00 a.m. and 2:00 p.m. Admission to the event is free.

Activities include the rollover car, a dynamic demonstration emphasizing the use of seatbelts provided by the Missouri State Highway Patrol. Also, the NO-ZONE truck will show you the blind spots around 18-wheelers. Get into the cab and see for yourself.

In addition, the Safety Council of Greater St. Louis is providing SAFETYVILLE. This is a small town to help teach young children the safe rules while cycling. Tricycles are provided, and you are encouraged to bring bikes 20" or smaller.

The Police Department and Fire Department have several employees licensed as technicians to install child car seats. Keep your children safe and have the seats checked at the car seat checkpoint. Appointments are recommended and can be scheduled by calling the Community Service Unit at 290-8425 or 290-8424.

Police and Fire equipment will be on display and officers will be available to answer questions.
