Storm Response

On Thursday, November 30, a devastating winter storm moved through Clayton, leaving behind a blanket of ice and snow, a trail of broken tree limbs, blocked roadways, and extensive power outages throughout the City. The City's Public Works road crews immediately initiated efforts to clear the streets, with all being fully cleared of snow by December 1, and of trees by December 2. Public Works also immediately enlisted the aid of the City's Parks staff to assist with a Citywide tree limb collection and removal effort.

Generally, the City takes responsibility for picking up street tree limbs only in the public right-of-ways. The City's street crews are neither staffed nor equipped for a Citywide collection on a regular basis. However, given the heavy amount of damage throughout Clayton, the City launched an extraordinary effort to assist residents with limb pickup and disposal from private property as well. Beginning on December 4, a City crew was assigned to each of the City's wards; a fourth crew was responsible for removing hanging limbs. In addition to the tremendous amount of manual labor involved, many of the limbs were so large that heavy equipment was needed. Since the City does not have a site for disposing of the limbs, the City rented an additional chipper, and borrowed another from Richmond Heights to reduce limbs to mulch.

Emergency Communications

It is critical for residents to obtain helpful information during a disaster. After the December storm, Clayton City Government used several methods for disseminating storm related updates.

1. Telephone Notification System: The City transmits periodic telephone messages through the Community Services Office

Check Your Trees

During the recent storm, trees interfering with power lines played a major role in power outages, which emphasizes the importance of proper tree placement to avoid future conflicts with power lines. Chapter 20, Article 6, Section 20-112 of the City's Code of Ordinances specifies that "No street trees other than those species listed as

News from Clayton Ward I

The City of Clayton is buzzing with activity, with the recent approval of thousands of square feet of new residential and retail spaces. We look forward to the first transportation-oriented development adjacent to the Forsyth MetroLink Station and other exciting projects that will bring urban dwellers to walk our streets and frequent our services.

Excitement is also brewing in the east end of town, on a smaller scale and ideally suited to Ward I. Enhancing the vibrancy of commercial Clayton Road will be DeMun Pointe, a 3 ½ story development offering 27 condominium homes and street-level retail services. This will be a LEED-certified "green" building with outdoor terraces and modern amenities, within walking distance of parks, playgrounds and restaurants. Additionally, a new multi-family project has been approved for 6615 Alamo Ave. consisting of nine condominium homes and offered by Cornerstone Properties with a target completion of May 2008.

A number of enhancement projects are currently being studied for HiPointe-DeMun, including reconstruction of the entrance monument at DeMun Ave. and Clayton Road, historic lighting replacements from Northwood to Clayton Road, extensive micro-surfacing for street preservation, and possible banners, benches and trash containers to highlight the DeMun commercial area.

There has been a request to rename Alamo Park, a cozy pocket park in the 6400 block of Alamo Ave., as Henry Wright Park, a tribute to this innovative urban planner who prepared the 1917 plat for the first New Town neighborhood with a diversity of housing and retail services. We invite residents to contact us with their views about this change.

Currently, Ward I residents are actively participating on three key task forces to assist the City with future planning. Serving on the Housing Task Force are: Joanne Boulton, Nicki Herrington, Andrea Dallas-Maddox; the Ice Rink Task Force are: Julia Clemens, Tom Horlacher and Cunthia Rapponotti; and the Hanley House Council is: Thomas Courier. Your input regarding these important initiatives is encouraged.

Our institutions contribute in a multitude of ways to the unique environment of Ward I. Our lives are enriched daily as we enjoy beautiful campus grounds and activities, and interact with neighbors who are faculty members. We are pleased to welcome Thad Falkner in his new position as headmaster of Wilson School, and we continue to value this school's commitment to the area.

We have been working with Washington University (WU) and Fontbonne University to partner for irrigating the Wydown median east of Big Bend. This cooperative partnership enhances the neighborhood and allows the City to better care for its investment of plantings. As presented at the annual WU Neighbors Council meeting, the underground parking garage on Danforth Campus is well underway to providing 535 parking spaces for students and visitors. You may be aware that Concordia Seminary has announced its intention to sell the former CBC property, and we will be closely following any developments.

It is a critical, and often delicate, balance to ensure that all vital components of our community continue to thrive in the best possible way. We welcome citizen participation at every step as we engage in decision-making processes to position ourselves in the 21st Century.

"Her dedication, sincerity and professionalism have been appreciated by many during her service to the City."

First Female Battalion Fire Chief

On December 2, 2006, Diann Straatmann was promoted to the rank of Battalion Fire Chief, replacing Battalion Fire Chief James Worth, who retired recently after 33 years of service. Diann is the area's first female Fire Chief Officer. She has been with Clayton Fire Department for over twelve years and has served as a Fire Captain for the last five years. Diann is a Missouri licensed Paramedic and is certified by the State of Missouri as a Fire Fighter II, Fire Apparatus Driver/Operator, Fire Cause Investigator, Fire Service

Instructor II and a Fire Officer II. She is nationally certified as a Fire Service Fitness Trainer and is an Instructor at the St. Louis County Fire Academy. Diann's formal education includes two Associate's Degrees in Biology and Fire Science and a Bachelor of Arts Degree in Management from Webster University.

Diann has been a very active contributor to the Clayton Fire Department during her 12-year tenure, most notably as a Departmental Training Officer, Heavy Rescue Technician for our Regional Rescue Taskforce and the Clayton FD Rescue Squad assigned to Missouri Urban Search & Rescue Taskforce-1. She has also written several grant requests that have greatly improved Clayton Fire Fighter safety, health and wellness. The City is proud to have Diann and the other highly qualified members serving the citizens of Clayton and the community.

Finance Award

The cleanup took two full weeks to complete, as several areas such as Claverach Park, the Moorlands, and Hi-Pointe DeMun required more than one pass through. During this time, the regularly scheduled leaf collections were put on hold because staff was already working overtime on storm recovery, and ice and limbs impeded the leaf collection process. Two weeks were added to the leaf collection schedule to assure that this task too was completed properly.

Residents are asked to gather any remaining debris into 4-foot by 2-foot bundles for pickup as yard waste by the City's private refuse/yard waste collector.

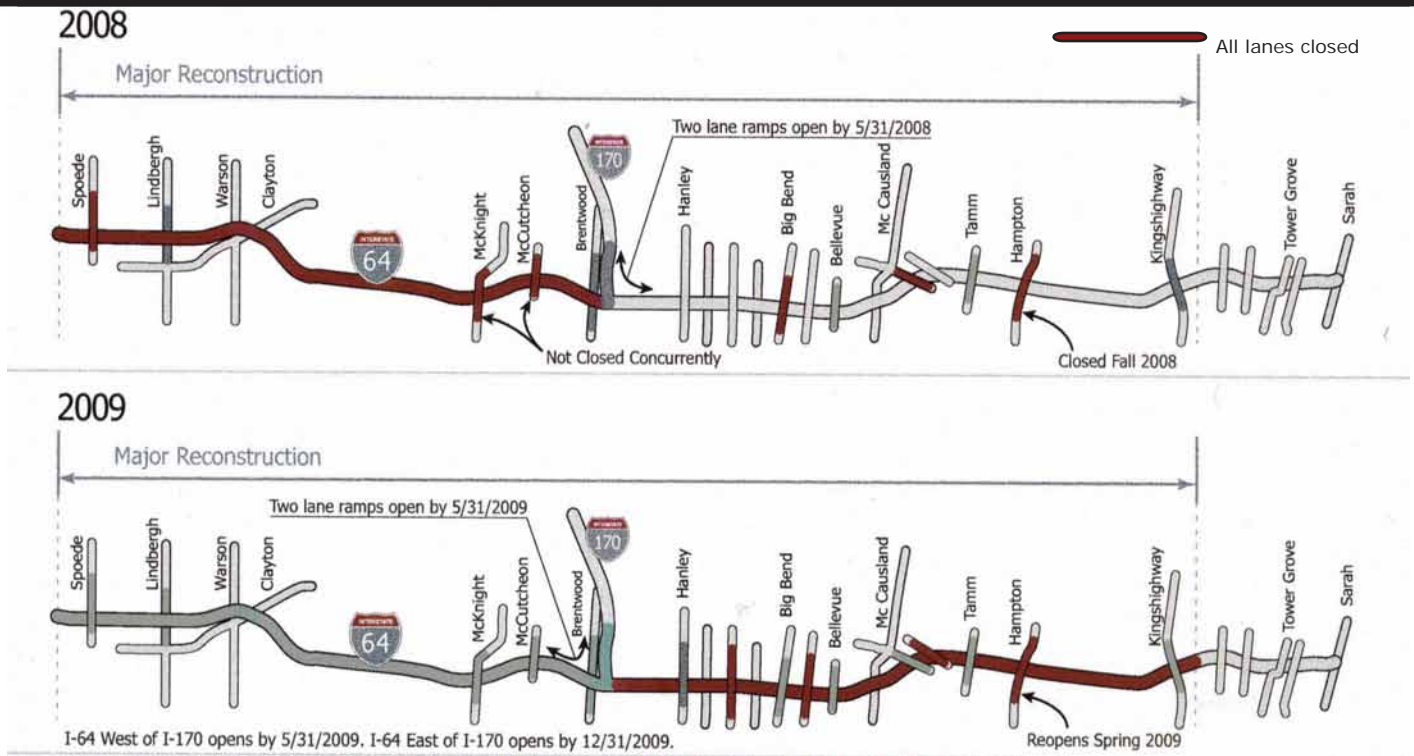
City Parks crews also worked to clean up City parks, where 120 trees were damaged; damage was so bad in Taylor Park, it had to be temporarily closed. Additionally, The Center of Clayton extended its hours, and served as a warming station for residents who were without power.

The City expects the cost for this winter storm cleanup effort to be in excess of \$70,000.

The New I-64 Project Begins with Lane Closures along I-170

Lane closures related to The New I-64 reconstruction project started on Monday, Jan. 8, 2007. Gateway Constructors, the company under contract with MoDOT to rebuild I-64, closed various lanes of I-170 between Galleria Parkway and Eager Road in preparation for the construction of a new I-64/I-170 interchange. Commuters will experience traffic tie-ups as a result of I-170 lane closures during 2007. A rough timeline shows that all lanes of I-64 will be closed from Ballas Road east to I-170 in 2008, and all lanes of I-64 from I-170 east to Kingshighway will be closed 2009.

UPDATE: Gateway Constructors recently announced that the westbound access to I-64 via Hanley Road will be closed in March 2007 and is expected to be closed for three years. Project Overview

The Missouri Highways and Transportation Commission awarded the design-build contract for the I-64 reconstruction project to Gateway Constructors. The \$420 million project will completely reconstruct I-64 from west of Spoeede Road to east of Kingshighway Boulevard, a distance of about 10 miles. It will create a freeway-to-freeway interchange at I-170; rebuild 29 bridges and all 12 interchanges. One lane will also be added in each direction from west of Spoeede Road to I-170. Ice Rink Task Force

In October, the Board of Aldermen discussed issues related to the operation of the Shaw Park Ice Rink; major and costly repairs were cited as the immediate challenges. As reported in the December 2006 CityViews, the Board of Aldermen decided to close the City's Ice Rink for the 2006-2007 season. Staff suggested establishing a task force to conduct a thorough study and then provide recommendations to the Board.

At its Nov. 28 meeting, the Board appointed citizens: Matt Durham, Tom Horlacher, John Hungerford, Maggie McNamera, Cynthia Rapponotti, Julia Clemens, Ira Berkowitz, Michael Steinbaum, Eric Schneider, William Wilson, Jared Novelty, G. Thomas Mitchell, and Joan Wendt to serve on the Ice Rink Task Force. Specific areas the Task Force has been asked to focus on are issues related to the operation of the ice rink including current conditions and usage of the existing ice rink, potential partnerships, and future options for operations. The group has been meeting bi-weekly since Dec. 13th, has defined the problems and has established objectives. At the Dec. 26th meeting, a time line was discussed and the following vision statement was written:

The Shaw Park Ice Rink shall be a unique multi-purpose destination that serves the athletic, leisure, recreational and wellness skating needs of the Clayton community. To do so, we will provide quality reliable ice and amenities that enhance the experience for our community.

The Task Force will present an update on its progress at the Board of Aldermen's Discussion Session at 7 p.m. on Tues., Mar. 13th. It is expected to submit its recommendations to the Board in April 2007.

Emergency Training

As expected, the new Cross County MetroLink Extension is fulfilling a real need in the St. Louis Metropolitan area. During the week following its opening in August 2006, ridership jumped by about 20,000, and according to Metro's Director of Communications Dianne Williams, that level has remained steady.

As part of the opening of the new route, Metro organized a group called the Fire Life Safety Committee. The Committee, which consists of personnel from MetroLink and chief officers from each city along the new route, conducts training sessions for emergency first-responders. Sessions for first-responders to learn emergency procedure have been held in Illinois and the City of St. Louis. Most recently first-responders from Shrewsbury, Webster Groves, Maplewood, Brentwood, Richmond Heights, Clayton and University City participated in the training, which included tours of the MetroLink cross-county extension, classes and training exercises.

The groups visited the MetroLink repair facility, toured each station, and examined the route and station layouts.

"Most of the emergency training these first-responders receive focuses mainly on major disasters," said Clayton Fire Chief Mark Thorp. "These sessions focus on evacuating individuals who have been hurt or are experiencing a heart attack for example." Thus far incidents have been minor. The Fire Life Safety Committee continues to meet and review procedures on a quarterly basis.

Parks & Recreation Master Plan Update

Master plans provide guidelines for City departments and direction for staff. Over the years, the Parks & Recreation Department has been guided by a Master Plan that was created in 1992, which resulted in the construction of The Center of Clayton, the rebuild of Shaw Park Pool and a variety of other projects that have enhanced the recreation and leisure opportunities for the community.

The City wants to be sure the future direction of the department is on target. City staff has been working with the consulting firm, Planning Design Studio, to complete a new Parks & Recreation Master Plan. Part of the process was to issue a Community Needs Assessment Survey. The City received an overwhelming citizen response to the survey, which indicated that 91% of our residents utilize City parks and facilities on a regular basis, compared to the national average of 56%. This made it clear that Clayton citizens genuinely care about the recreational and leisure services available to them.

At 7 p.m. on Feb. 27th, the consultants will present their findings at the Board of Aldermen Discussion Session. small trees may be planted under or within 10 lateral feet of any overhead utility wire, or over or within 5 lateral feet of any underground water line, sewer line, transmission line or other utility." These general concepts should also be applied to tree placement on private property. The Arbor Day Foundation advises that trees not to exceed 20 feet in height may be planted within 20 feet of power poles; trees planted 20 to 50 feet from power poles should not exceed 40 feet in height. Property owners are asked to carefully select the species of trees to be planted near power poles; to be sure existing trees are properly maintained and trimmed; and to allow AmerenUE onto private property to trim trees when they are in the area.

Facts about Clayton

Q. What is the date of the electronic recycling event?

A. Clayton is partnering with Web Innovations & Technology Services (WITS) to hold an electronic recycling event on Friday, Mar. 23, from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. and Saturday, Mar. 24, from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. in the south parking lot in Shaw Park.

Businesses and residents may dispose of computers, printers, phones, pagers, fax machines, and small appliances, copy machines and televisions (console TVs must be dropped off at the WITS facility on Holly Avenue). WITS guarantees secure Department of Defense removal of all data on reusable computers. WITS also guarantees that all non-reusable items will be recycled appropriately, and that they will not be put into the landfill.

A donation of \$5 is requested for disposal of each monitor and television. Additional donations help cover costs of repairing computers for low-income families. All donations are tax deductible.

The Friday event focuses mainly on businesses, who must complete the Electronic Collection Business Reservation Form. The form and more details are available on the WITS Web site: www.witsinc.org.
