Clayton Is One of Only Three AAA Rated Cities in the State

The City of Clayton recently joined an elite group of municipalities when Standard & Poor's Ratings Services raised Clayton's standard general obligation bond rating to AAA. The upgrade from an AA+ rating reflects the strength of Clayton's healthy operations, maintenance of very strong financial reserves and good economic growth.

"This is the highest rating we can achieve and reflects a strong track record of sound policy and management practice as well as confidence of the investment community that Clayton has an excellent future," said City Manager Craig Owens.

Standard & Poor's rates only 3 Missouri cities and a total of 9 Missouri government entities AAA. Nationally, this elite AAA group includes 220 government entities. Standard & Poor's cites four key factors when assigning an AAA rating to a municipality: a strong and proactive administration; effective debt management policies with moderate to low debt ratios; a vibrant and diverse economy; and a strong track record of financial management supported by sufficient reserves and policies that guide management practices.

Evaluating the financial management team is also part of the rating process. Management must have strong, interactive relations with elected officials, favorable budgeting results and a track record for managing through good and bad economic periods. The team must demonstrate a focus on the

future, which includes good revenue and capital forecasting and tax base development, and the ability to react during the fiscal year to ensure the city's financial position.

Factors that also contribute to Clayton's AAA rating status are the city's strong median household income which is 155% and 142% of state and national levels, respectively. The city's tax base shows strong growth mainly through redevelopment with an average annual growth rate of 6.4% since 2005. The city's 2008 market value totaled \$3.874 billion, translating to an extremely strong \$303,524 per capita. Median home values in 2008 were 317% of the national average or \$561,947.

AAA rated communities exhibit common characteristics. They carry easily manageable debt loads and have high per capita property values, which represent a significant investment in property. In economic downturns, higher-valued properties typically retain value through recessions.

Despite the challenges that come with a weak economy, the City of Clayton maintains solid financial footing. Standard & Poor's expects Clayton's healthy financial performance and strong general fund balance reserves to continue. The management team is expected to monitor and control the city's diverse revenue streams and demonstrate the ability to successfully manage through all economic cycles.

Clayton continues to build its status as a force on a national level. This powerful image is due in no small part to a competent and conscientious city staff that works daily to perfect performance and provide higher levels of services.

- In February, Standard and Poor's Rating Service upgraded the city's general obligation bond rating to AAA, which is a result of diligent and persistent monitoring of the city's financial situation and strategic planning for the future. The city maintains its strong financial footing and has upgraded its bond rating, all during challenging economic times.
- Clayton's Police and Fire Departments are dedicated to protecting our citizens and to maintaining a safe and secure environment. Currently, the Police Department is undergoing an assessment to be reaccredited by the Commission on Accreditation for

Law Enforcement Agencies, Inc. (CALEA). If the department is awarded reaccreditation in July, Clayton will be one of only seven cities in the State to have sustained accreditation standing for over a decade.

- Our beautiful streetscapes are maintained by the hardworking Public Works Department. For the seventeenth consecutive year, Clayton is a Tree City USA. The ever-present Public Works crews are hard at work trimming trees, collecting leaves and planting flowers and shrubs. This summer they will also be busy with microsurfacing projects in several subdivisions.
- The Parks & Recreation Department manages operations at the busy Center of Clayton, where the fitness center was recently renovated. Parks & Recreation staff is also responsible for maintaining the city's ten parks; crews are busy preparing the parks for spring and summer. The city is gearing up for the start of the its impressive lineup of special events and activities, and the Parks & Recreation staff is at the heart of these preparations.
- The city is working toward increasing interactivity with the public. Recently, Municipal Court staff introduced a online payment service, which allows customers to pay traffic tickets via the Internet.
- To better understand our residents' perception of city operations, a survey was conducted. Questionnaires were sent to 1,500 randomly selected households asking for input about the services the city provides to the community. The results of this process will help staff make modifications to resources and provide services that meet the needs and expectations of Clayton citizens.
- Clayton is taking the lead in a new Red Cross program. The Ready Rating Program helps businesses, organizations and schools prepare for emergencies. As a pilot municipality, Clayton has a leadership role in a program that will eventually effect the safety of the entire community.
- And, how many communities, even on a national level, have development projects underway? The developers of the Centene Plaza project continue to move forward. The former Library Ltd. building has been razed, and the contractor has been conducting site preparation and foundation work for the Phase 1 office tower.

To say I am proud to be a resident, let alone the Mayor, of such a fine city is an understatement. I hope all citizens, businesses and residents, recognize the benefits of being a part of this community and realize the outstanding job each city department does to accomplish its respective goals and responsibilities. Clayton city staff not only efficiently conducts daily operations but also provides the foundation for the city's respected reputation.

- The City bond rating has been upgraded to AAA; this is the highest rating awarded by Standard and Poor's and has been a goal of the City for many years and will allow the City to pay a lower interest cost on the refunding of General Obligation Bonds.
- A citizen survey to evaluate the City's performance on key service indicators is currently being conducted.
- Our Police Department continues to be a recognized leader within the law enforcement community and has maintained International Accreditation for the past twelve years.

City Adds New Online Payment Service

Municipal Court staff recently announced the availability of a new online payment service. Customers can now pay traffic tickets via the city's online payment site https://www.ipaycourt.com/clayton. A convenience fee based on the rate of the ticket will be added for this service. However, customers will have the opportunity to terminate the payment online process, if they choose. This payment service is only for traffic tickets.

"Municipal Court staff is very excited about the advancement toward enhanced customer service and a paper-free court," said Court Clerk Debbie Aston. "We are working to make other online payment services available in the near future."

MSD Rain Barrels

Metropolitan St. Louis Sewer District (MSD) recently announced the sale of rain barrels to customers. MSD customers qualify to purchase rain barrels if they live within MSD's service area and are not delinquent on MSD bill payment.

The environmental benefits of rain barrels are numerous. Water collected in a rain barrel can be used to water a lawn or a garden. Rain barrels can reduce water pollution by reducing stormwater runoff, which contains pollutants like sediment, oil, grease and bacteria. Rain barrels can often take the place of splash blocks.

MSD rain barrels cost \$45 per barrel. Customers can purchase a maximum of four barrels and are responsible for picking up and installing them. Detailed installation instructions will be included with the purchase.

To purchase a rain barrel, call the MSD Billing Department at 866.281.5737 between 8 a.m. and 5 p.m. Monday through Friday from March 2 to March 20. Payment is required at the time of purchase. There will be no discounts on MSD bills for purchasing rain barrels. For more information, call 314.768.6238.

Clayton Leads in Emergency Preparedness

The City of Clayton takes the lead again – this time working with the Red Cross on an emergency preparedness program. The Red Cross Ready Rating Program is a first-of-its-kind membership program. It helps businesses, organizations and schools become better prepared for emergencies. The program kickoff was held on March 18 at The Center of Clayton.

A FOCUS St. Louis community task force report identified emergency preparedness as a top priority. Residents believe it is important and socially responsible for employers to take steps to become better prepared.

Being part of the program requires participants to establish a commitment to steadily improve emergency readiness over a one-year period. Participants then conduct an analysis of disaster vulnerability and develop an emergency response plan. Employees are educated, and the emergency response plan is implemented.

"The city is proud of its role as a pilot municipality for the Ready Rating Program and of our collaboration with the Red Cross," said Mayor Linda Goldstein.

As part of the Accreditation for Law Enforcement Agencies, Inc. (CALEA) assessemnt process, the community is invited to offer comments.

ACCREDITATION ASSESSMENT

On April 4, 2009 a team of assessors from the Commission on Accreditation for Law Enforcement Agencies, Inc. (CALEA) began the process of examining all aspects of the Clayton Police Department's management and operational practices. There are 460 standards that the department must satisfy to maintain its international accreditation through the commission.

The department initially obtained accredited status in 2000, and successfully achieved reaccreditation in 2003 and again in 2006. Clayton's Police Department is one of only seven cities in the State of Missouri that has sustained accreditation standards for more than a decade. Successful compliance for its third re-accreditation will be a significant achievement that underscores the department's long-standing commitment to excellence.

As part of the four-day on-site assessment, the community is invited to offer comments at a public session on Monday evening, April 6, at 7 p.m. at The Center of Clayton or by calling 314.691.0250 on the 6th between 1 and 5 p.m. Written comments should be mailed to: Commission on Accreditation for Law Enforcement Agencies, Inc., 10302 Eaton Place, Suite 100, Fairfax, Virginia, 22030-2215.

The findings will be reported to the full commission to decide if re-accreditation will be granted. A favorable ruling means the department's accredited status will again be in force for an additional three years, during which time the department must continue its compliance with current CALEA standards.

Right Tree - Right Place Program

For the second year, Clayton's Public Works Department is working with Ameren UE on the Right Tree – Right Place Program to remove trees growing into overhead wires. In 2008, Ameren contract crews removed 60 trees for which the city was reimbursed \$100 per tree. These funds pay for stump removal and reforestation. In 2007, the funds were used to reforest areas adjacent to Big Bend Boulevard in Oak Knoll Park.

Trees removed as part of this program are recycled. Limbs are processed and used as wood chips and mulch for landscaping. Annually, the city generates approximately 4,000 cubic yards of wood chips from tree trimming and removals. Large logs are hauled by solid waste haulers and sent to a recycling processing facility where they are ground into mulch and chip material also used in landscaping.

Even after trees are removed, they continue to beautify Clayton.

2009 Mulch Deliveries

Annually, the leaf collection program generates approximately 12,000 cubic yards in a three-month period. Leaves are turned and ground to produce a quality compost, which is available to the public and delivered to residents for a modest delivery charge. Residents should call 314.290.8540 to make a mulch delivery appointment.

2009 Spring Leaf Collections

Leaves will be collected during the first two full weeks in April, the weeks of April 6 and 13. Leaves will be collected according to the Street Sweeping Schedule. A link to the schedule is available on the HOME page of the city's website: www.ci.clayton.mo.us

Busy Construction Season Planned for Spring and Summer

The Public Works Department has a busy construction schedule planned for this spring and summer. Many of the improvement projects involve the city's roadways and will impact traffic. The following locations are included in this year's project schedule:

- Cecil Avenue Starting in May, the roadway including driveway approaches, sidewalk ramps and isolated areas of curb and gutter will be completely removed and replaced. Anticipate partial road closures and isolated periods of restricted access to driveways.
- Brentwood Boulevard and Maryland Avenue Starting in May, curb and gutter replacement will begin. Microsurfacing of the pavement is scheduled for weekends during the month of June. Anticipate major road closures and detours.
- Wydown Boulevard Microsurfacing of the pavement is scheduled for weekdays during the month of June. Anticipate partial lane closures and isolated periods of restricted access to driveways.
- Davis Place Subdivision Starting in June, there will be spot pavement repairs and curb ramp upgrades followed by milling and asphalt overlaying the full width of the pavement in July.
