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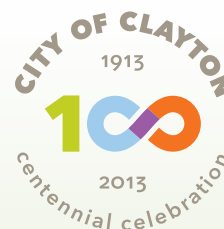


In 2013, the City of Clayton celebrates its centennial. It is the City's goal to start its next 100 years with a new long range plan.

In 2012, a process to develop a new strategic plan was conducted. Fifty community stakeholders committed to the year-long process called *C the Future*. The entire community had the opportunity to share their visions, ideas and aspirations.

"We are grateful for the amazing response from the community," said Mayor Linda Goldstein. "We hope everyone will view the final Strategic Plan document to see how their input helped shape Clayton's future."

➤ Public Safety



GOAL I: Ensure the public's safety and respond effectively and efficiently to all emergencies throughout the community.

GUIDING PRINCIPLE I: The City consistently assesses its performance to ensure that all citizens receive high quality emergency services. Clayton has developed and long provided excellent emergency response services through its dedicated Police and Fire Department personnel.

Recognitions

- Firefighter/Paramedics Bryan Brielmaier and Peter Hellwege received Unit Citations from the Greater St. Louis Area Fire Chiefs Association for rescuing and treating a University City fire victim.
- Captain Phil Lopez was honored by St Louis County Executive Carlie Dooley and the 86th Fire Academy Recruit Class for his commitment to fire recruit training, years of service as a new recruit instructor at the academy and his service on the board of directors for the fire academy.
- Assistant Chief Paul Mercurio received the Platinum Service Award from the St. Louis Fire Sprinkler Alliance for fire prevention activities.
- The department received the Greater St. Louis Fire Chiefs Special Programs Award for Fire Training.
- For the fourteenth year, the department received the Life Safety Award for Fire Prevention and Life Safety Programs provided to the community.

Accomplishments

- Firefighter/Paramedic Joshua Barnaby was deployed by the US Air Force Reserves to the Middle East for six months.
- Chief Mark Thorp, Captain Jeff Counts and Administrative Secretary Kathy Brooks-Maness were deployed by the National Disaster Medical Service to provide emergency support for the Republican National Convention in Tampa.
- Captain Brian Neukirch was deployed with the Urban Search & Rescue System, Missouri Taskforce-1 to provide emergency support for the area in New York City hit by super storm Sandy.
- Clayton, Richmond Heights and Maplewood Fire Departments received and trained on new Self Contained Breathing Apparatus and Bailout System
- Clayton firefighters working off duty:

Under the medical direction of Dr. David Tan, advanced cardiac care equipment has been added to all EMS units. Two Auto Pulse automated cardio-pulmonary resuscitation devices and pre-hospital hypothermia (temperature lowering) systems have been purchased. Clayton paramedics have received extensive training and are prepared to provide treatment using the new state of the art equipment to improve patients outcomes from cardiac arrest.

Accomplishments

- **Effective Crime Solving:** The department was instrumental in apprehending suspects in various crimes committed in Clayton. Clayton detectives also investigated and assisted in convictions of suspects involved in crimes committed in Richmond Heights, University City and St. Louis City.

- **Drug Take Back Event:** Coordinating with U.S. Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA) agents, the department conducted the city's National Drug Take Back Event where citizens turned in unused pharmaceuticals for proper disposal by the DEA. Officers collected 292 pounds of drugs at the Clayton event held at The Center of Clayton.

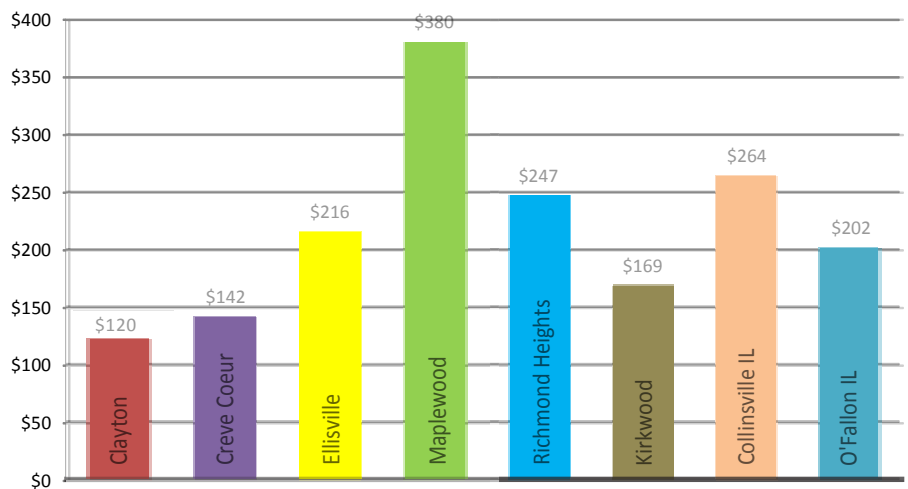
Recognitions

- For the fifth time, the department successfully complied with over four hundred nationally recognized standards to qualify, and was unanimously approved for the three year accreditation award from the Commission on Accreditation of Law Enforcement Agencies (CALEA). Clayton is one of 12 accredited agencies in the St. Louis metropolitan area. The department is one of only eight in Missouri and 131 nationally listed as CALEA flagships.

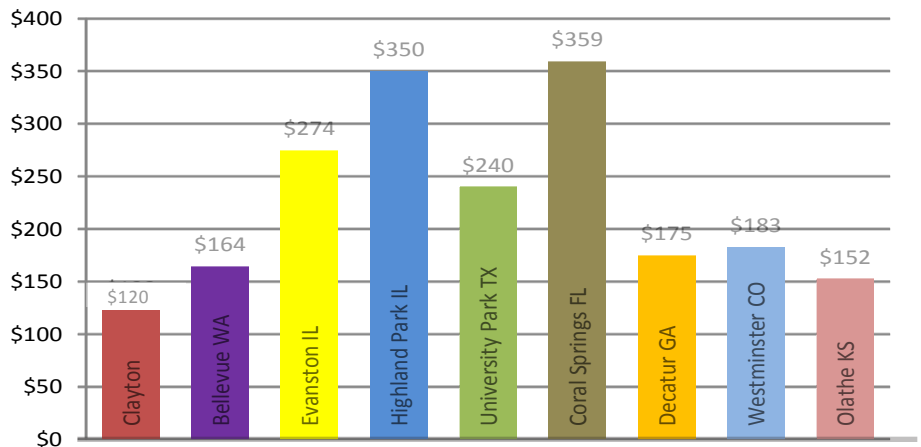

Clayton provides exceptional levels of service at the lowest average cost per capita.

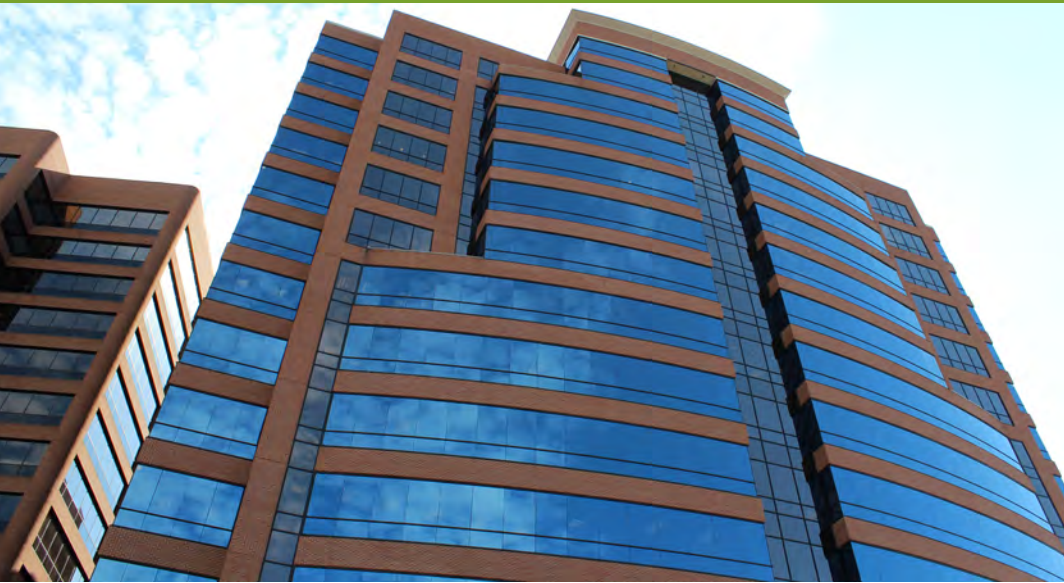
St. Louis Consortium Police Cost per Capita (2011)

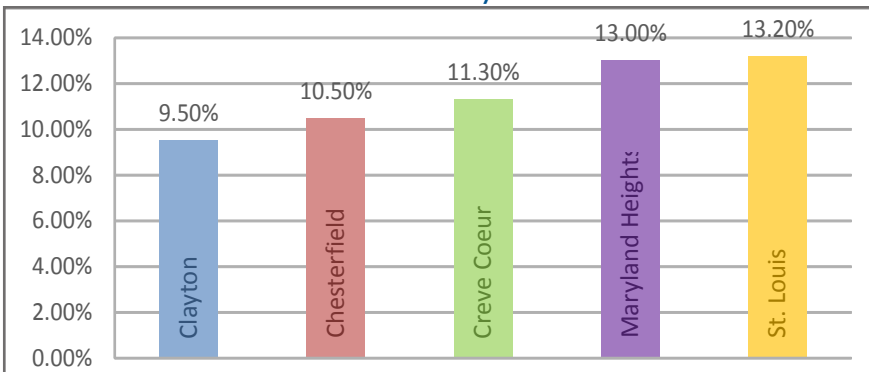

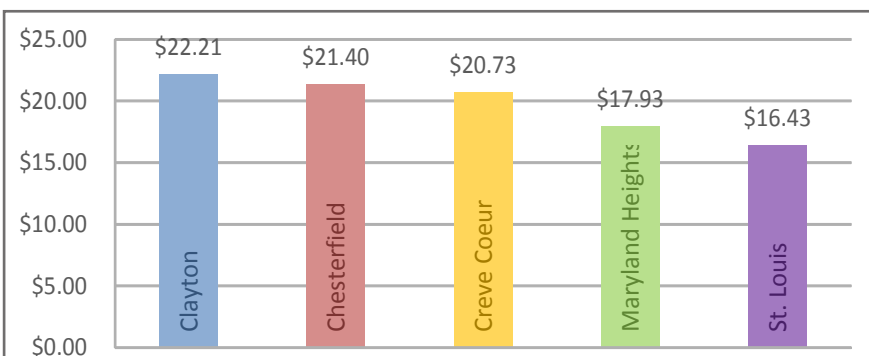

➤ Planning & Sustainability

GOAL III: Create and maintain a beautiful, clean and healthy community where resources are used responsibly.

GUIDING PRINCIPLE III: Clayton resolves to be a leader in environmental initiatives. The goal is to incorporate sustainability in daily operations without increasing costs and to incentivize best practices, such as LEED certification and green roofs, by developers of new and existing buildings. We also recognize the importance of expanding the citywide recycling program to further reduce the amount of refuse transferred into local landfills.



With ISO ratings for Building Code Effectiveness Grading System that equal 2 for commercial and 3 for residential, Clayton's Planning & Development Services Department continues to receive the highest ISO grading within the state.

Accomplishments

- Continued to exceed 30% of total residential waste diverted from landfill through the collection of recyclables, yardwaste and compostables.
- Just under 30 tons of electronics were recycled during the 2012 Electronics Recycling Event sponsored by the Public Works Department and Web Innovations Technology Services.
- Over 6,400 tons of construction material was recycled from 2012 City projects.
- Removed 6 tons of trash and 120 tires at the 2012 River Des Peres Trash Bash Stream Clean-up Event that otherwise would have polluted the stream.
- Just under \$1,000,000 in Energize Missouri Communities Grants funded by ARRA Federal Funds used to install high-efficiency Heating/Cooling and Lighting Systems for the new Police and Municipal Building at 10 S. Brentwood.
- At 160 kW, the solar array system installed at the new Police & Municipal Building at 10 S. Brentwood is the largest non-utility owned system within the state of Missouri.
- Reduced energy consumption by 45% and increased the light levels and uniformity on sections of the City's roadways by replacing old street lights with 25 new high-efficiency street lights.
- The City adopted its first set of regulations that define solar and wind energy systems which expanded two critical goals of the energy policy: reduction of environmentally harmful emissions and attaining greater national energy independence.
- The City was selected to partner with Shrewsbury, Brentwood, Maplewood, and Richmond Heights as one of eleven Community Planning Areas in partnership with the East-West Gateway Council to develop a regional sustainable plan to create a more sustainable, equitable, and livable St. Louis metropolitan area.
- The City is drafting updated landscaping regulations to encourage the effective preservation of substantial trees and promote the planting of trees and other vegetation that will make real and lasting contributions to the appearance and value of property and neighborhoods. The Board of Aldermen and the Plan Commission/Architectural Review Board have proposed a landscape and tree preservation ordinance that will be considered in Spring 2013.

➤ Recreation & Culture



Accomplishments

- Dedicated the Hanley Park Pavilion and new pathways which enhance the participation and accessibility of Hanley Park. The ADA improvements enrich experiences at the Historic Hanley House and Hanley Park for everyone. The project was made possible through Clayton Century Foundation (CCF) donations, grant funding and a city match.
- Completed the Shaw Park Tennis Center project that replaced the original asphalt courts with post-tension concrete tennis courts which last longer and are less likely to crack. A portion of the project was funded through a Municipal Park Grant Commission grant.
- Received over \$1.7 million in project funding through grants and CCF donations.
- Increased revenue to more than \$239,000 for approximately 4,800 personal training sessions, the best year since The Center of Clayton opened, and an increase of 27% over FY2011.
- Added 4.63 acres of green space through the acquisition of property at Haddington Court through a FEMA buyout program.
- The Taste of Clayton returned to the streets of Clayton attracting nearly 5,000 visitors and benefiting Operation Food Search.
- Launched Friends of the Parks, a statewide initiative to build a base of park supporters and advocates.

Recognitions

- The Commission for Accreditation of Parks and Recreation Agencies (CAPRA) designated the department a nationally accredited parks and recreation agency. Recognized by the National Recreation and Parks Association Congress, the department becomes the fourth agency in Missouri, the second in the St. Louis metropolitan area, and one of only 109 accredited agencies across the United States.

- The Missouri Parks and Recreation Association's (MPRA) Public Official Award was presented to Mayor Linda Goldstein for her outstanding and sustained contribution to recreation and parks and maintaining Clayton's exceptional quality of life.

- Received the Missouri Arbor of Excellence Award in cooperation with the Clayton School District from the Missouri Department of Conservation for efforts to restore the Nature Trail at the Family Center at Gay Avenue.

- Fields Technician Josh Slayback received the Pioneer Athletics' 2012 Field of Excellence Award for outstanding athletic fields and the hard work of the crews who diligently maintain them.

> Transportation

GOAL V: Foster all safe and accessible modes of travel including walking and biking.

GUIDING PRINCIPLE V: Clayton is committed to preserving the quality of pavement maintenance and to developing specific plans that promote safe alternative modes of travel, such as pedestrian friendly streets and walking and biking paths throughout the City.

Accomplishments

Clayton's Public Works Department:

- Completed the design of the Traffic Signal Improvement Project to improve traffic management and the Pedestrian Enhancement Project to expand the Downtown Streetscape. Valued at \$280,000 and \$2M respectively, both projects are 80% funded by federal grants and set for construction in 2013.
- Began the design process of two projects scheduled for 2014 construction, both will be 80% funded by federal grants: the Brentwood/Carondelet Streetscape Project to expand the Downtown Streetscape and the Wydown Boulevard Resurfacing Project to improve the roadway condition and provide enhanced multimodal access. The grants are worth \$709,000 and almost \$3M, respectively.
- Upgraded twelve curb ramps on Wydown Boulevard to ADA standards through the use of \$52,000 in Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funding.
- Administered more than \$770,000 in federal grant funds to finance the replacement of the Forsyth Boulevard Pedestrian Underpass, which connects the north and south areas of Washington University's Danforth Campus. Washington University provided the balance of the funding for the project, a total construction value of \$2.3M.
- Repaired over 3,200 square feet of public sidewalks.
- Extended the life of just under 50 lane miles of roadways through implementation of Public Works' Pavement Management Program.

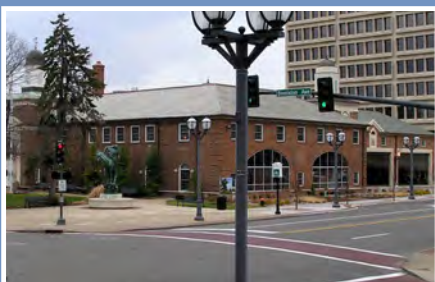

- Justin Whipple, Don Forrest, and Rob Doebber received the OSHA Hazardous Materials Operations/OSHA Level II Certification for completing eight hours of training in hazardous material spill response.

Accomplishments

- Coordinated with the City's strategic plan consultant to facilitate the *C the Future* process that resulted in the new Strategic Plan Vision and four Key Performance Areas.
- Introduced the City's interactive citizen engagement website *ClaytonConnects*.
- Held the second annual Clayton Community Day, which is a component of the City's community engagement process and demonstrates the City's commitment to creating environments in which citizens and elected officials interact.
- Collaborated with various departments and the city centennial planning committee on the initial announcements about the year-long calendar of events.

Recognitions

- For twenty-five consecutive years, Clayton's Finance Department has been awarded the Certificate of Achievement for Excellence in Financial Reporting for its Comprehensive Annual Financial Report (CAFR) which recognizes the highest standards of financial report preparation.
- The Finance Department was awarded the Distinguished Budget Presentation Award (DBPA) for the fifth year in a row. Both the CAFR and DBPA awards were presented by the Government Finance Officers Association (GFOA) of the United States and Canada.
