

In the last several issues of CityViews, we've studied Clayton's impressive municipal services. Here we share the amazing recreational and cultural activities provided by our Parks and Recreation staff.

For over eleven years, Clayton's Parks and Recreation Department has overseen the daily operations of The Center of Clayton where a wide array of programs, services and athletic activities take place. The recreation staff is also responsible for managing the Shaw Park Aquatic Center, Tennis Center and Ice Rink and the Hanley House, the city's Historical Hanley House Museum in Hanley Park. This dedicated staff is also responsible for effective and efficient maintenance of grounds and beautifully landscaped areas throughout all ten city parks and six recreational facilities. Staff also assists with a variety of special events held throughout the city.

Recently, the city opened Shaw Park Tree Top Playground, the Inclusion Playground designed for children of all abilities. This spring the Sensory Garden opened nearby, celebrating the world of plants through the stimulation of the five senses (sight, sound, smell, taste and touch). Similar to the Inclusion Playground, the Sensory Garden is accessible to all abilities.

We evaluate facilities and offerings to expand appeal to and participation by all citizens, including multigenerational groups with diverse interests and abilities. Clayton residents place great value on community amenities that provide a wide array of recreational and cultural activities.

In the past year, over 21,000 people participated in aquatics, fitness, sports and community recreation programs; more than 650,000 have visited the city's recreational facilities hoping to improve their health. Nearly 30% of Clayton's residents have purchased a season pass to one of the city's recreational facilities. Clayton's Parks staff proudly states that they are in the business of helping to "Build a Healthy Community".

In preparation for the city's centennial celebration in 2013, the department is partnering with the Clayton Century Foundation (CCF) on several Master Plan

projects. Combining funds from the CCF with grants from the state and county will allow the city to make improvements to the trail system and tennis center in Shaw Park; acquire artwork for the Century Garden located between the aquatic center and ice rink; as well as other exciting enhancements that will help to celebrate the city's incorporation. With a focus on history, Hanley Park will be the site of a new ADA accessible path system and a small pavilion that will serve as a teaching area and relaxation venue for visitors to the Hanley House.

The Parks and Recreation Department strives daily to provide services that will help improve the quality of life for all residents.

This series of reports will continue in the October issue of CityViews with highlights about services provided by our Public Works Department.

Over the past year or so, our Parks and Recreation Department celebrated the opening of the Inclusion Playground and Sensory Garden. The communication staff launched our new, dynamic website with upgraded interactivity and functionality. The city became the first Green Power Community in Missouri and one of only 38 in the country. A new sculpture by Gerard Tsutakawa was installed in front of the Crescent enhancing Clayton's world-class art collection. Our Public Works Superintendent Gary Scheipeter became one of the Top Ten Public Works Leaders in the nation. Recently, we conducted forums to discuss priorities for the 2012 budget, and sixty-three concerned Clayton citizens attended and provided their thoughtful input.

In July, we celebrated the first anniversary of enacting the ban on smoking in all enclosed public spaces. Although some business owners expressed concern at public hearings during the 2009 discussions about the ban, it appears that the ban has not had a negative effect on commerce. To the contrary, we find that during the year since the ban was imposed, Clayton restaurateurs have opened multiple locations; one has even voluntarily banned smoking on his patio. Several new restaurants have opened including: Bocci Bar at 16 N. Central, Break 'n Egg at 7814 Forsyth, DeMun Oyster Bar at 740 DeMun, Half & Half at 8135 Maryland, Imo's at 23 N. Bemiston, Mad Tomato at 8000 Carondelet, and Mosaic Bistro Market at 14 N. Central.

We were concerned about the health of our community, and we did what we thought was the right thing to do. Since approving the ordinance that expanded Clayton's smoking ban, several other cities and counties locally and in outstate Missouri have taken our lead in protecting the public's health.

We are proud of setting this trend that will result in a healthier environment not only for Clayton citizens and visitors but for the communities that have followed Clayton's example and enacted broader more comprehensive bans on smoking.

These are just a few examples of how Clayton works to stay on the cutting edge of trends and services.

E-Alert

Clayton's Police and Fire Departments understand the importance of maintaining visibility and connecting with the community. They realize that knowledge is critical to preventing potential crime and disaster.

The Police Department coordinates the Citizens' Police Academy and National Night Out events to educate citizens and help create awareness. The department issues Crime Phone messages to inform subscribers of criminal activity and provide information and instructions about crime prevention and emergency preparedness.

The Maune Company Promotes Environmental Responsibility

In 2002, Ramsey Maune founded The Maune Company, which specializes in the management, leasing, acquisition and development of office, retail and industrial property in the Saint Louis and Houston. The Maune Company acquired The Equity Building in Clayton four years ago. Mr. Maune renovated the building and continues to search for ways to improve the building for its tenants.

He got an idea from a Trailnet flier. To promote a healthy lifestyle and environmental responsibility, he now provides bicycles - two Electra California Cruisers - for tenants in the building.

"I just used one for an appointment in Clayton," said Mr. Maune.
"These bikes are so cool looking - it was great!"

Tenants can check out an Electra, a bike helmet and lock to use for exercise or to run errands.

Recycling Creates Jobs

while we preserve the environment, we are putting people to work

Most commonly recycling is associated with "going green" or "saving the environment." But did you know that this industry provides jobs for approximately 28,026 employees in the state of Missouri? Missouri recycling, remanufacturing and reuse firms along with the transportation industry are all affected when you recycle at home or at work. Valuable resources, once harvested from the earth, get placed back in the marketplace to continue service to society. So before you throw something away, rather than tossing it, "think resource, not trash", and think about the job that you are providing regionally.

In April, the city celebrated its designation as the first Green Power Community (GPC) in Missouri and one of

only 38 in the country. This was a significant milestone. However, while Clayton was in the process of achieving its goal of turning 2% of energy consumption into renewable energy, the EPA increased the participation goal for all GPCs by 1%. Clayton has until the end of 2011 to achieve this new 3% threshold.

Because of the support of 33 Clayton businesses and over 200 residents, the city passed the 2% goal by 15% a month early. Clayton's GPC team is confident that there are more businesses and residents who will be signing up to purchase Renewable Energy Credits (RECs) or install on-site solar electricity. Meeting the city's new challenge will help reduce our carbon emissions, change how power is generated in Missouri and promote economic development in Clayton and the state.

2012 Annual Operating and Capital Improvements Budget

In keeping with its commitment to fiscal responsibility, the city conducts public meetings annually to examine the city's Annual Operating and Capital Improvements Budget and to engage citizens in the budget preparation process. This year, the city conducted a very successful campaign to encourage better participation at these annual budget forums. As a result, a total of 63 business and residential citizens attended three interactive forums to discuss 2012 budget priorities.

During the 90 minute meetings, City Manager Craig Owens gave a 30 minute presentation. Then the audience was asked to form small groups to discuss the budget and to develop a list of opinions, comments and questions. A spokesperson from each group shared the highlights of the conversations, which provided the basis for changes made to the 2012 draft budget.

Interestingly, the same ideas resonated – increase revenue by growing the economic base; develop specific alternatives for adjustments to services and for balancing the tax burden between commercial and residential; and provide specifics about what expenses have already been reduced.

"We were thrilled to have so many participate in the forums. The questions that came from the breakout sessions were probing. The comments and suggestions were extremely helpful," said City Manager Owens.


Opportunities for further review of the 2012 draft budget will be provided for citizens who were unable to attend the public forums in June. The Mayor and Board of Aldermen will discuss the draft budget at meetings in Council Chambers at Clayton City Hall on August 23 and September 13. The public hearing on the 2011 tax rates and the FY2012 budget along with the first reading of the ordinances will be on August 23; the second reading and approval of the 2012 budget on September 13.



The city is grateful to its concerned citizens for their interest in the community and support in making these important 2012 budget decisions.



In his presentation, City Manager Owens pointed out that the 2011 citizen satisfaction survey included a question about options for closing the \$1 million General Fund deficit. The charts below show that there was no strong preference for increasing property tax by 12 cents, increasing sales tax by one-half cent, paying \$15 per month for rear yard trash pickup or cutting services. The strongest sentiment was the 64% not in favor of reducing service levels.





Another Award for Quality Financial Reporting

The Government Finance Officers Association (GFOA) recognized Clayton's Finance Department for preparing budget documents of the highest quality and reflecting both the guidelines established by the National Advisory Council of State and Local Budgeting and the GFOA's best practices on budgeting. The Distinguished Budget Presentation Award (DBPA) was created to encourage and assist state and local governments in achieving the goals set for quality financial reporting.

Clayton has received the Distinguished Budget Presentation Award for four consecutive years.

\$8.5 Million in Grant Funds Pay for Major Improvements

Clayton's Public Works Department has been very successful in obtaining funds through grants that will help finance several of the city's Capital Improvement Projects. Starting this year through 2014, the city will receive over \$8.5 million in grant funds that will pay for major projects such as:

- Forsyth Boulevard/N. Meramec Avenue Roadway Resurfacing (Surface Transportation Program)
- Forsyth Boulevard Pedestrian Underpass (by Washington University) (Surface Transportation Program)
- Wydown Boulevard Roadway Resurfacing and ADA Curb Ramp Improvements (Surface Transportation Program)
- Citywide Traffic Signal Improvements (Congestion Mitigation and Air Quality)
- Downtown Streetscape Improvements (Surface Transportation Program-Enhancements)
- 10 S. Brentwood Building Energy Efficiency Improvements (American Recovery and Reinvestment Act)


The funding categories are administered by the Federal Highway Administration and Federal Transit Administration and are included in the Transportation Improvement Program produced by East-West Gateway Council of Governments.

The grant funds significantly help in easing the city's financial challenges by supporting the improvement and maintenance of city-owned assets.
