A Message from Mayor Linda Goldstein

Term limits retire Clayton's first female Mayor



After serving eight years as a Ward II alderman and six years as mayor, this is my last message to you as an elected official of the City of Clayton. I am so proud and honored not only of being elected by my fellow citizens, but of serving as an official of such an exceptional community.

Many thoughts ran through my mind as I prepared this final message, thoughts of some of our achievements during my six years in office.

• **The retention and expansion of the Centene Headquarters.**

Centene brought jobs to Clayton not only through their own operations but also by providing much needed construction jobs during the economic downturn. The company and its employees are enthusiastic corporate citizens, and we're proud that they are part of our community.

• **Implementing our Smoke-Free Ordinance** that served as a catalyst for St. Louis County and City smoking bans. We listened to our citizens and worked with the business community to bring our city, and ultimately the entire region,

in line with countless communities across the nation in protecting public health. The political courage of my Board and the exemplary public engagement process - civil and inclusive - is a model for how democracy should work. The process and its end result make this possibly my proudest moment in office.

• **Achieving AAA financial rating.** In 2009, when we first received this rating, we were one of only three municipalities in the state to achieve this status. Now there are a total of six in the state, but it's fair to say that we're still in an elite group.

• **Becoming the first community in Missouri to be designated as an EPA Green Power Community**...one of many environmental initiatives that have helped to maintain our status as a leader in sustainability practices.

• **Finding an appropriate site for our much needed new Police Station.** The old police station was inefficient, too small and riddled with environmental hazards. During my 14 years in office, finding the right opportunity was a priority.

The renovation of the new police station, which was dedicated in January, follows our trend setting sustainability practices. The building will be LEED Silver certified. By taking advantage of federal and state grants and utility rebates, the largest non-utility solar panel system in Missouri was installed.

The city will see an annual energy savings of nearly \$23,000 and will have recouped its investment in approximately 5 years. Over the 25-year warranty life of the solar panels, Clayton will save about \$873,000 on its electric bills. The solar panels will prevent enough carbon dioxide emissions to equal 14 million miles driven by car or planting 74 acres of trees over 25 years.

• And, the Board of Aldermen's **support of two critical new projects—the renovation of the County Courthouse and new Family Justice Center and a new Mid-County branch of the St. Louis County Library.** We welcome the St. Louis County Library's investment in a new, upgraded facility in our community.

Clayton is proud to be the seat of St. Louis County, one of our largest employers. St. Louis County will spend \$100 million to build a new family court building and renovate the 40 year old courthouse building. In addition to being an investment in Clayton's downtown, the county project will put the current World Trade Center and Family Court sites on the tax roll.

When I was elected Clayton's first woman mayor in 2007, the nation's economy was booming and so was Clayton. We were working with a number of developers and planning some big projects. But then the recession hit, and most

of these projects were postponed or cancelled. The city's revenues declined, and we therefore had to dip into our savings to continue to provide the services our citizens had come to expect. But we were fortunate. We had a healthy reserve that enabled us to make conservative, well-researched decisions. This year the Board of Aldermen approved a budget with a three year plan to eliminate deficit spending. The plan calls for a combination of increased efficiencies, \$1.3 million in strategic expense reductions, and increases in revenue. In 2015, we expect to have a balanced budget while maintaining a healthy reserve level of 50%.

Clayton didn't just survive the economic downturn, the city thrived. Since I was elected mayor, we have had a net increase of approximately 2,200 jobs in Clayton.

Clayton is now home to a number of new restaurants including Crushed Red, Choice St. Louis, Niche, Pastaria, Bar Les Freres, 5 Star Burgers, Brazikat, Pickleman's, Country Gentlemen, ZPizza, Libertine and Seedz. Sales tax revenue from restaurants has increased approximately 3% per year each year since 2010.

Recently joining Clayton's vibrant retail business community are: The Kabbalah Bookstore, Regus, the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation, Saville Row, Sweet Boutique, Lagoon Magoo Toy Store, Vatterott Court Reporting, The Fur Center, Sip Salon and several new fitness facilities.

Companies like CBRE, The Gathering and Avis chose to reinvest in a Clayton location. The former Daniele Hotel is being redeveloped into

a Hampton Inn & Suites. Clayton on the Park reopened as apartment rental units which is stimulating interest by other residential project developers. This will bring more residents to downtown which fulfills a priority of our Downtown Master Plan.

As important as it is to identify our past achievements, it is as important to me to have a plan in place for our city as we enter our second century of existence and as I prepare to leave office. Just as a successful business has a vision, goals and strategic plan in place, Clayton needs to plan to ensure its future success. So, in 2012, we conducted a process called *C the Future* to develop a long range strategic plan. The entire community had the opportunity to share their visions, ideas, and aspirations. This year-long process resulted in goals for four key performance areas that provide a well-defined road map as we enter our next 100 years. With our outstanding professional staff and dedicated elected officials, I feel confident that Clayton's future is in good hands. Additionally, our community benefits from the work of the Clayton Century Foundation (CCF) which generates private support for public projects. The fine work being done by the CCF will make projects happen that otherwise might not have been possible without the dedication of these remarkable volunteers.

The energetic members of the Mayor's Youth Advisory Council learn the community service ropes by attending Clayton's board and committee meetings and conducting government related activities. Their genuine interest in public service gives me confidence in the future stability of our community.

As we continue our centennial year, we look back at an impressive history and ahead with the confidence that Clayton will continue its status as a premier community, and one of the best places to live and work in the region, state, and country! Thank you for the honor of serving as your mayor.

Clayton's Finest

Renovation of Clayton's new police station, located in the historic Heritage Building at 10 S. Brentwood, has been completed. The building was dedicated and is now fully operational. The building features the latest technology available and improved security for the officers as well as citizens visiting the building. As impressive as it is, the men and women of Clayton's Police Department are even more impressive.

This past summer the Department received re-accreditation from the Commission for Accreditation of Law Enforcement Agencies (CALEA). The Department also received the Advanced Accreditation Award and is only one of 14 municipal police departments in the State of Missouri to receive that distinction. To receive this award the Department needed to comply with 464 standards set by CALEA.

Year after year, the City's survey of residents indicates that police protection is among the most important services the City provides, and they rate Clayton's Police Department highly. The average response time for police calls is under four minutes, a speed with which 94% of residents are satisfied. The 94% satisfaction rate is impressive compared to a satisfaction rate of 72% from residents nationwide. The bottom line is that in 2012, the vast majority of residents surveyed - 94% said they feel safe in Clayton.

The feeling of safety is justified. Clayton has at least four cars patrolling Clayton's two and a half square miles at all times, and also has officers stationed at Wydown Middle School and Clayton High School whenever school is in session. While no community is immune from crime, Clayton's crime statistics compare very favorably to surrounding communities. The most common type of crime in Clayton is thefts from autos, many of which are left unlocked. Crimes against persons are extremely rare, with just 23 instances of violent crime in 2012 which is less than 8% of all crimes in Clayton in 2012.

Whether responding to emergencies or making traffic stops, Clayton's police officers take pride in their work. They are professional and courteous, and provide us with protection and service at an exceptionally high level. They deserve our appreciation and thanks.

Rainscape Rebate Program

On November 27, the City of Clayton passed a resolution supporting the goals of the Deer Creek Watershed Management Plan and the implementation of the Rainscape Rewards Rebate Program. The Deer Creek Watershed includes the land and tributaries draining into Deer Creek. Clayton is one of 22 municipalities that fall inside of the Deer Creek Watershed area.

Consistent with its history of leadership in environmental initiatives, Clayton is taking a proactive role in reaching out to its citizens to assist in creating landscapes that help improve stormwater management.

“We all live in a watershed, and the landscaping and building practices of all landowners directly affect the health of the streams into which the watershed drains,” said Mayor Linda Goldstein. “This plan intends to reduce the negative impacts of stormwater with an emphasis on plant-based solutions.”

The plan’s purpose is to minimize adverse impacts from rain events with a focus on plant-based solutions and community engagement. Implementing the recommendations in this plan can improve water quality and reduce the need to build stormwater drainage facilities.

Launched in January, the RainScape Rewards Program is a voluntary rebate program that financially assists landowners in the Deer Creek Watershed who wish to landscape their yards to improve stormwater management.

Clayton Dedicates Its New Police Station



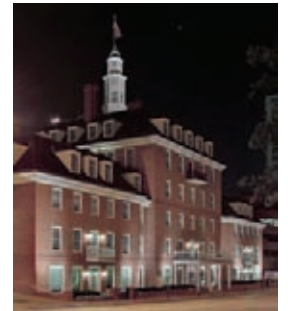

More than 100 attended the dedication ceremony and ribbon cutting at the newly-renovated Heritage Building on January 26. The building at 10 South Brentwood Boulevard is the new home for the Clayton Police Department, the city’s IT department and another regional law enforcement agency.

Among those on hand for the ceremony was Janey Symington, the daughter of Sidney Studt who built the six story Colonial Williamsburg-style building in 1959, and representatives from the general contractor Paric and architect Lawrence Group. Paric and the Lawrence Group worked with the city on preserving the historic features of the building, while incorporating the advanced technology to improve security and environmental elements to make it the most energy efficient police building in the State of Missouri.

“We don’t know who is more pleased, Janey Symington or the city and its outstanding Police Department,” said Mayor Linda Goldstein. “Janey has expressed gratitude for the care the city took to preserve the quality of the building’s original trappings. After years of cramped and environmentally hazardous space at 227 S. Central, Clayton police officers are thrilled that they not only have more space, they are working in an beautiful building with 21st century technology .”

Besides advanced technology and improved security, the new police headquarters is energy efficient and 75% larger than the previous headquarters building. The department moved into its new headquarters in February.

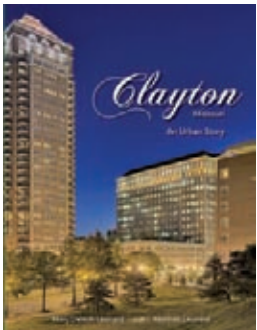

As Clayton celebrates its centennial, we look back and realize how much has changed over the 100 years. Joyce Kilmer wrote tributes to nature and the beauty and splendor of trees. But, over the years we have learned how important trees are to the environment. Trees are the ultimate green product. They clean the air, conserve energy with their shade, save water, prevent erosion and combat greenhouse gases. Trees soak up storm water and its pollutants and help control flooding. Park Project Update

- Construction on the Shaw Park Recreational Trail began in late February and is scheduled to be completed by early June. While this project is disrupting activities in the park, staff is working diligently with the contractor to ensure that this impact is minimized, especially around the playgrounds, shelters and ball fields. Once completed, residents will be able to enjoy 1.8 miles of trail throughout the park.

- The new nature garden, Moneta Garden, at the north end of the trail is the site for Geometric Abstract #2, a sculpture by Ernest Trova which is on loan from Laumeier Sculpture Park and St. Louis County. Works by Ernest Trova, a Clayton High School graduate, are recognized throughout the art world. Park visitors looking for a place to relax and enjoy nature are encouraged to visit Moneta Garden.

- There is a new Outdoor Fitness Area at the south end of the trail which provides the opportunity to exercise while enjoying the

outdoors and the beautiful park setting. This concept has been tested in other areas of the country, and the city is pleased to bring this amenity to our residents.

- The Century Garden between the pool and ice rink will be the home for *Molecular Bloom with Single Flower* a sculpture being created by artist James Surls. This centennial sculpture is in the fabrication phase with installation planned for late August.

- Upgrades have been made at the Hanley House. Windows are being refurbished and new porches and ADA ramps have been constructed. The new ramps will allow access to both the lower level of the house and the summer kitchen.

The City of Clayton will celebrate the official opening of the Centennial Greenway, a 1.84-mile stretch of trail along I-170 that reaches into the northwest side of Shaw Park. Built by the Great Rivers Greenway District (GRG) and supported by sales tax dollars, the Great Rivers Greenway District was created to help build a stronger St. Louis by working to connect people to one another and to nature through greenways, parks and trails. This trail will eventually connect Forest Park to Creve Coeur Park and enable residents to take advantage of the miles of walking, biking and running trails available throughout St. Louis.

National Drug Take Back

The Clayton Police Department, in cooperation with the U.S. Drug Enforcement Administration, will conduct a National Prescription Drug Take Back Site in the parking lot at The Center of Clayton. Police officers and Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA) agents will be accepting expired, unwanted or unused pharmaceutically controlled substances and other medications for disposal.
