A Profile of Clayton's New Mayor

Harold Sanger elected 21st Mayor of Clayton



Apparently Harold Sanger's down to earth, straightforward style resonated with his constituents, because on April 2, citizens elected him Mayor of the City of Clayton. After 25 years of service to the community, six years as a member of the Board of Adjustment, nine years as a Ward III Alderman and ten as the Chairman of the city's Plan Commission/ Architectural Review

Board, he decided it was time to take on the city's top job. Late in 2012, he began working with a group of supporters on his campaign to run for Mayor of Clayton.

The first item on his campaign slate was to balance the city's budget.

"The city must take a proactive approach to our budget issues," said Mayor Sanger. "The three year plan to balance the budget must be properly managed and adjusted to ensure that a balanced budget is attained. While celebrating the 100th anniversary of the city's charter, we must work to establish a strong fiscal base to take our community into its second century."

Protecting the character of residential neighborhoods, promoting economic growth through increased residential opportunities in the business district, and enhancing Clayton's leadership in sustainability, culture and commerce are also priorities for the new Mayor. He intends to focus on preserving the city's impressive past while working to shape its future.

Clayton has benefitted from his 25 years of service to the community. His tenure resulted in the completion of several

significant projects that include the Cross County MetroLink Extension, The Crescent, Centene Plaza, the Downtown Master Plan and The Center of Clayton.

However, he recognizes how Clayton successes have always been the product of collaborative efforts of the city's involved citizens, business community, school district and great institutions. Throughout its history, the individuals in these groups have been responsible for guiding Clayton through its transformations and keeping it on a prosperous path.

"When I think back over the past 25 years, I realize how many of these devoted individuals were involved in what has become an important part of the legacy of Clayton's first 100 years," said the Mayor. "Together, we will set the stage for Clayton's next 100 years, while maintaining the city's regional leadership and national recognition."

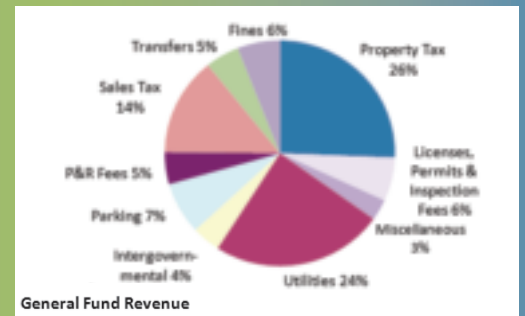
City Manager Recommends FY 2014 Budget

Presenting the second year of implementation of the deficit elimination plan, City Manager Craig Owens will transmit his recommended budget to the Mayor and Board of Aldermen in July. Most notably the recommended plan will implement significant cost reductions primarily derived from reductions in staffing through a retirement incentive program.

In 2013, 39 city employees are qualified to retire. The city offered a program to allow employees to take lump sum payments of the pension payments they already earned in exchange for declaring their retirement on a given date (December 31, 2013). Nineteen employees accepted the program.

The predictability of the retirement dates has allowed the city to reduce the overall staffing by only refilling 9 of the 19 positions that are being vacated. The proposed budget presents a plan to reconfigure the leaner organization and still deliver very high service in all departments.

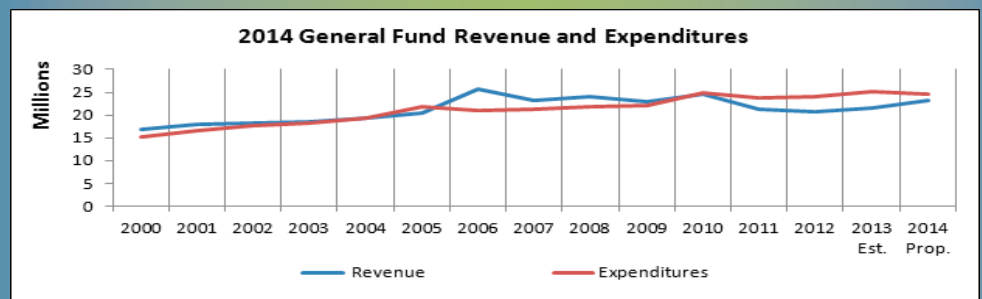
The proposed budget maintains market-based pay and benefits for employees, funds the waste hauling contract services at unchanged levels, and maintains high levels of core services in police, fire, EMS, streets, parks and recreation, and code enforcement.



General Fund economic related revenues, which have faltered since the global economic recession, have recovered to near 2008 levels. The recommended budget predicts a steady increase of 1.2% in property tax collections, 3.1% in utility tax collections, and 2.75% in sales tax receipts compared to the previous year. These are the three largest sources of revenue. All revenues combined show an increase of 2.2%.

Overall expenditures in the proposed budget show a decrease of 1.2% in FY2014. In addition to reductions in personnel and commodities, contractual expenditures will also decrease with the exception of utilities such as electricity, gas, and water charges for operations.

Citizens are encouraged to attend and provide input during budget forums that will be held on Thursday, July 25 from 2 to 4 p.m. and from 6 to 8 p.m. in Council Chambers at Clayton City Hall. The Mayor and Board of Aldermen will review the recommended budget and hold public hearings to receive additional comments from the community before modifying and adopting the final budget. Public hearings have been scheduled for 7 p.m. on August 27 and September 10 at City Hall. My colleague, Alderman Andrea Maddox-Dallas, has graciously allowed me to write this column and share a profound personal experience. Thank you, Joanne Boulton.

At 3:58 a.m., on a cold, icy February morning, my husband, hollering over the blare of our fire alarm, jostled me awake – “wake up, we have to get out.” Within minutes, as our house was filling with smoke, flames licking at us from our walls, we tumbled out of the house with our terrified beagle to the welcoming arms of Clayton Police Officer Kim Currie. Our monitored smoke alarm had done its job and called 911. As we shivered in the frosty pre-dawn, we could hear the blare of the fire trucks. By 4:07 a.m., the first truck, “A” Crew of the Clayton Fire Department, arrived and jumped into action. Thanks to the quick and courageous efforts of these professionals, our home was saved, although badly damaged, and many of our possessions rescued.

The two-alarm fire required over 12 crews from cooperating fire departments. Since the roads were icy, Clayton Public Works crews were enlisted to clear them for the emergency vehicles. Our fire and the processes it initiated showcased the amazing city services we have here in Clayton. As an alderman, I daily see the work of the dedicated city staff from our city manager to the hourly summer hires watering the city’s right of ways. As a citizen, I experienced the extreme life and property saving aspects that we all take for granted.

In emergency situations like this, minutes count. Our smoke detectors saved our lives and our monitored alarm saved our house. If you haven’t, please install smoke detectors, check them annually and consider adding a monitored system to minimize response time. In a typical home fire, you may have as little as two minutes to escape once the smoke alarm sounds. Knowing how to use those minutes wisely can make a life-saving difference. Developing and practicing a home fire escape plan will help you snap into action immediately if the smoke alarm sounds, so you can get out quickly and safely. ➤ CDBG Public Hearing

The City of Clayton will hold a public hearing to discuss the allocation of \$22,500 in Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funds, which will become available after January 1, 2014. The public hearing will be held at 1 p.m. on Friday, July 19, 2013, in Conference Room C on the first floor of Clayton City Hall at 10 N. Bemiston Avenue in Clayton, Missouri.

USGBC Selects Clayton Project

In late February, the Clayton Police Department moved into its newly renovated headquarters at 10 S. Brentwood. Besides advanced technology and improved security, the conversion of the Williamsburg style, circa 1958 six-story office structure involved environmentally responsible construction best practices. These best practices involved using light fixtures, HVAC, plumbing fixtures and other systems that ensure the most efficient consumption of natural resources. An overhaul of the existing adjacent three-level, 120-space parking structure, that should be completed this year, included an elevated Solar Photo Voltaic Array.

The array is the largest non-utility owned solar installation in Missouri, and the only elevated solar array in the state. It was selected as one of two projects presented at the United States

Green Building Council's (USGBC) - Missouri Gateway 10th Annual LEED Showcase in May. The array makes the city eligible for the highest levels of certification through the USGBC Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design (LEED) program. It will provide on-site renewable energy, and generate approximately one-third of the yearly electricity consumption of the fully-occupied building.

An abundance of sustainable strategies in the design, construction and on-going operations and maintenance of the building were used during the renovation. The city challenged the project's end users, architects, engineers and constructors to meet or exceed the guidelines of LEED in an effort to reduce the impact that renovating the new police and municipal facility would have on the environment.

Clayton's Complete Streets Policy

One of the Top 10 Best in the Nation

With its longstanding focus on providing safe and accessible modes of travel, the city took an official stand last year when it passed an ordinance adopting the Clayton Complete Streets Policy. That policy is now being recognized by the National Complete Streets Coalition based in Washington, DC.

The coalition helps towns and cities design streets for all users including motorists, pedestrians, bicyclists and transit riders. Of the approximately 130 policies adopted in 2012, Clayton's Complete Streets Policy ranked 9th and appeared on the coalition's 2012 list of Top 10 Complete Streets policies.

Clayton's approach to creating safer roadways started in 1997 with its first streetscape improvement project. Over the years, the city has been recognized for its environmental leadership in promoting alternate modes of transportation and safe approaches to biking and walking. TrailNet recognized Clayton with its Healthy Living award in 2010 and with an Active Living Honorable Mention

in 2012. In 2011, the city received an award from the Society for the Blind and Visually Impaired for pedestrian improvements in downtown Clayton. Former Mayor Linda Goldstein received a Distinguished Service Award from the Missouri Bicycle Federation in 2012.

Clayton continues this tradition with an all-encompassing plan that stresses the need for safe streets for citizens of all ages and abilities, and breaks down the traditional separation of roadways, transit and biking/walking.

"Clayton's Complete Streets policy is one of the best in the country," said Stefanie Seskin, Deputy Director of the National Complete Streets Coalition. "We want to recognize Clayton's leadership in this field, and also to show other cities across the country what a great Complete Streets policy looks like. Clayton has done that extremely well."

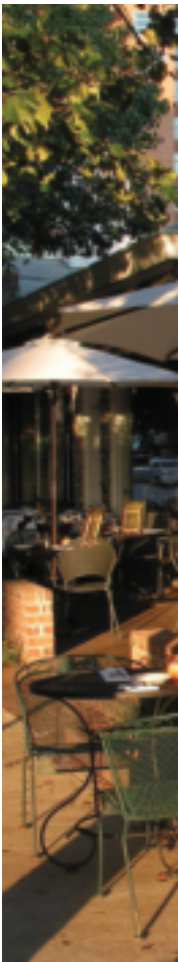
