From the Mayor's Desk

City Hall

Welcome to the fall 2013 issue of City Views. With the change of the seasons and the start of the city's new fiscal year on October 1, changes are also underway at City Hall.

The #1 priority for your elected officials has been to reset the city's expense structure as a first step toward achieving a balanced budget. To facilitate that effort, the decision was made to offer a one-time opportunity for early retirement to employees nearing retirement age. Nineteen employees have taken advantage of this early retirement opportunity known as the Deferred Retirement Option Program (DROP). While a few left in December 2012, the majority will be leaving at the end of this year. With them will go many hundreds of years of service to our community – several individuals with over 40 years. We will clearly miss them all. Of the 19 positions, we have determined that 9 must be refilled. With 10 fewer employees, and the 9 new employees earning less than their predecessors, the overall effect will be a substantial reduction in payroll.

The challenge, of course, has been how to manage this reduction in staff without affecting the services to which Clayton residents have grown accustomed. Through the persistent efforts of the City Manager, the city staff and the Board of Aldermen, we believe this can be accomplished with little noticeable change in service levels. We are grateful to those employees who will be taking on additional responsibilities and very proud of their can-do attitude

With the DROP program and the reduction of a host of other expenses, the deficit will be cut in half for the fiscal year starting October 1, 2013. How we cover the remaining deficit will be the subject of a future message.

DID YOU KNOW that Clayton owns and maintains 100 lane miles? It has been 20 years since the streets were repayed – it's time we revisit that project. More about streets in the next issue of City Views.

News from Ward II



Our City's centennial year, 2013, is almost at an end. As we join together to celebrate the centennial of the incorporation of Clayton, your Ward II Aldermen thought it would be interesting to take a look back at the area covered by Ward II in 1913.

The street car line known as the "Clayton 04" operated along a route that is now Wydown Boulevard. Passing into the eastern boundary of Ward II at Big Bend Boulevard (then Pennsylvania Avenue) you would have seen construction of homes in the new subdivisions of Brentmoor Park and Forest Ridge. On the south side of the route, Boland's large Claverach farm (present day Claverach, Moorlands and Forest Court



subdivisions) extended south to Clayton Road and west to Hanley Road, offering a wide view of the countryside and distant barns. To the north, the country estate of Robert Carr (present day Carrswold and Wydown Forest subdivisions) would have appeared, with his large home on the hillside. Just after the Carr estate, a small pond existed next to the street car line on the north before the "04" crossed Hanley Road and passed through the St. Louis Country Club grounds (now Polo) into the village of Clayton.

It is fascinating to look back at our City 100 years ago, and we can feel proud of where we are today. It is even more exciting to look to the future! Our year of celebrating the centennial will culminate in an event that helps us do all of these things! The Party of the Century! We can all enjoy a look at our past as well as seeing some of the plans for the future. Don't miss it - we will see you there!

The Clayton Century Foundation has also been busy working as a private 501(c)3 partner to support the City's Master Plan and to help fund priority park enhancements and capital projects. Because of the generosity of resident and business donors, the Foundation has raised funds to bring a number of significant projects to fruition during the Centennial, such as permanent public art, recreational trails, gardens and an inclusion playground in Shaw Park, a first-time dog park and restorative progress for the Civil War-era Hanley House in Hanley Park.

Why is the commitment to these quality of life amenities so important? A fascinating study conducted by Gallup and the John S. and James L. Knight Foundation examined what makes a community a special place. Nearly 43,000 people in 26 communities across the U.S. were interviewed over a period of three years. The 2008 "Soul of the Community" project found that three main qualities attach people to their communities, whether it was in Miami or Macon: Social Offerings, such as entertainment venues and places to meet, Openness (how welcoming a place is) and Area Aesthetics (its physical beauty and green spaces). And, attachment is an important metric because it was also proven to be linked to local economic growth.

Fostering attachment has been a driving motivation for planning the Centennial's festivities. Attachment inspires people to feel positively about the place where they choose to live, work and play. With a spirit of celebration, it is hoped that everyone - residents, workers and visitors – will participate in the City's final events to mark this historic year. After all, a 100th anniversary only happens every 100 years. Together, we will be well positioned to address the challenges of the next century. Please join in!

- Rather than the first week of October, the 2013 Leaf Collection Schedule will begin on the third week in October.

Parks and Recreation Update

The city recently completed projects in Shaw Park that have resulted in new features and amenities to enhance the park visitors' experience. The new recreation trail adds miles to the pathways in areas of the park that were previously unexplored such as the new native plant garden at the north end of the park. The trail now flows more organically to allow for ADA accessibility. It is slightly narrower which limits vehicle access and improves safety.

Two pieces of public art have been installed along the new trail. One by the late Clayton native Ernest Trova. The other is a commissioned sculpture by James Surls that was installed in Century Garden as part of Clayton's centennial celebration. It's Christmas Eve in the basement of a Chicago church that sometimes doubles as a homeless shelter. It is also the midst of the worst winter storm imaginable. The roads are impassable, there is no food in the pantry, and 41 guests are about to show up (including one seven-year-old boy).
