April 8 Election

During the April election, voters selected Richard Lintz to replace Andrea Maddox-Dallas as Ward I Alderman. Mr. Lintz will share the responsibilities as representative for the citizens of Ward I with Alderman Joanne Boulton.

Also sworn in with Alderman Lintz during the April 29 Board of Alderman meeting and elected to her third term as Ward II Alderman - Cynthia Garnholz, and elected to his second term as Ward III Alderman - Mark Winings.

Two of the four proposals voters were asked to consider passed.

Proposition A which proposed a ¼ cent sales tax increase to maintain the current levels of fire and EMS services. The tax increase will go into effect on October 1, 2014.

Proposition B, a \$15 million bond proposal to resurface and repave more than 50% of the city's neighborhood streets and update street lights, also passed. The bond will be issued later this year.

CDBG Public Hearing

The City of Clayton will hold a public hearing to discuss the allocation of \$22,500 in Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funds, which will become available after January 1, 2015. The public hearing will be held at 12:30 p.m. on Tuesday, July 22, 2014, in Conference Room C on the first floor of Clayton City Hall at 10 N. Bemiston Avenue in Clayton, Missouri.

Before coming to Clayton, Mr. Houdeshell served as Director of Public Works for the City of Manhattan, Kansas; for six years, he led and managed the city's Engineering, Water and Wastewater, and Streets and Fleet Divisions. From 2005 to 2007, as Manager of Special Projects for the City of Chesterfield, Missouri, he developed and

managed contracts for a \$25 million Parks Bond Issue, collaborated with Monarch Chesterfield Levee District on the design and installation of water and sewer lines, and collaborated with St. Louis County and MoDOT on various other projects. He served as Manager of Public Works Services and City Engineer for the City of St. Peters, Missouri from 1987 to 2005.

Mr. Houdeshell received his Bachelor of Science in Civil Engineering from the University of Missouri at Rolla, now MS&T. He is registered as a Professional Engineer (P.E.) in Missouri and Kansas.

"Clayton is a unique city committed to top amenities and service. Mr. Houdeshell brings a level of talent, knowledge and experience to our team that will continue our high standards and move us into the future," said City Manager Owens. "He is a welcome addition to our team."

Mr. Houdeshell was selected to fill the Director of Public Works position following a thorough and competitive search of talented applicants from throughout the midwest. He will succeed former Director of Public Works Michael Pratt.

Like many things we encounter in our own lives, the life of a road is cyclical. From the time a new road is constructed, it begins its decline. One of the tasks of Clayton's Public Works Department is the stewardship of our roads, maintaining them at a satisfactory level while efficiently managing the funding available. Clayton does this through its Pavement Management Program, the full text of which is posted at www.claytonmo.gov/projects. The Public Works Department has presented annual updates to this plan to the Board of Aldermen each of the past three years, most recently at the May 27 Board meeting.

Many cities and counties simply pave a street then forget about it for twenty years. While this approach may be easier, the pavement spends most of its life in less-than-satisfactory condition, and repair costs are increased in the long run. For instance, Hanley Road was resurfaced in 1998, and the County plans to resurface in 2015. Believe it or not, Hanley Road is actually "younger" than most city-maintained streets. Considering pavement management on a life-cycle cost basis, Clayton reduces overall cost while maintaining the pavement at higher levels during its life.

Approximately half of the City's streets are cracksealed each year (even years - east of Hanley, odd years - west of Hanley), which keeps water out of cracks in the pavement. The City's streets are generally microsurfaced seven and fourteen years after paving which further seals the pavement and prevents degradation. Finally, after twenty years, it is time for the asphalt to be removed and replaced.

Following voter approval of bond issuance in 1993, the City undertook major resurfacing projects from 1994 to 1998. Twenty years later, and thanks to voter approval in April, we are planning to resurface again, as planned. The first street to see significant repairs will be our beloved Wydown Boulevard. Knowing that Wydown would decline in the coming years, the City applied for and received a federally-funded grant (80% of the project cost) in 2011. Later this year, Claverach Park will be resurfaced and alleys will be replaced in Clayton Gardens, Davis Place, and Hi-Pointe. These will be the first projects funded by the new general obligation bond. But this is just the beginning. More resurfacing, alley replacement, and lighting replacement projects are planned for the next few years. See details at www.claytonmo.gov/projects

During his 36 years with the Clayton Police Department, Chief Murphy has demonstrated a commitment to the Clayton community. He has been instrumental in the department consistently achieving the CALEA (Commission on Accreditation for Law Enforcement Agencies) accreditation; one of only eight agencies in Missouri and 131 nationally that qualify for CALEA's Certificate of Advanced Accreditation. Chief Murphy is a graduate of the 207th Session of the FBI National Academy and currently serves on the FBI National Academy Associates and Options for Justice Board.

Chief Murphy received his Master of Arts: Management from Webster University, Master of Science: Criminal Justice Administration from the University of Central Missouri and Bachelors of Science: Administration of Justice from the University of Missouri - St. Louis.

"Our own Kevin Murphy distinguished himself in a very competitive national field," said City Manager Owens.

"He is a strong leader who will lead a very strong department to continue a tradition of excellent service to the Clayton community and the region."

Chief Murphy was promoted following a thorough and competitive national search of applicants. He succeeds former Chief of Police Thomas Byrne who retired in December 2013.

Commitment to Safety

Safety is Clayton's main priority and a source of community pride. The Clayton Police Department distinguishes itself through its exceptional crime statistics and conscientious, highly trained and educated staff.

The department received the annual **Outstanding Law Enforcement Agency** award for the St. Louis metropolitan area and surrounding counties, and is one of only eight in Missouri and 131 nationally that qualify for the CALEA (Commission on Accreditation for Law Enforcement Agencies) Certificate of Advanced Accreditation.

Crime statistic website, CityRating.com, indicates that Violent Crime in Clayton is 79.84% less than the national average and property crime is 37.88% below the average. Clayton's violent crime rate is 82.12% below the state average and property crime is 45.39% below the average.

This data is reinforced by the citizens of Clayton. According to responses to the city's annual citizen satisfaction survey, 95% are very satisfied/satisfied with Clayton's public safety services compared to an average rating of 80% for peer cities in Missouri and throughout the U.S. Comparing how safe responders feel downtown: Clayton's rate is 90%, peer cities in Missouri received 71%, and the national rate is 69%.

Safety is one of Clayton's most admired and emulated public amenities. Clayton police use tried and true methods to keep the community safe. Marked and unmarked cars, uniformed and plain clothes officers patrol residential neighborhoods and business districts. Officers on bicycles patrol neighborhoods, monitor subdivision parades and picnics, and patrol the city's special events. The department's leadership in new and innovative equipment and programs inspires crime prevention trends throughout the region.

Parks & Recreation Update

— Get to Know Clayton's Biking and Walking Trails

The City of Clayton is committed to building a trail system that meets the diverse needs of modern commuters and exercise enthusiasts. Trails in Shaw Park and Oak Knoll Park have been updated, adding to the length, ease of access and interconnectivity, while remaining minimally invasive to the parks. In Shaw Park, the paths now integrate natural areas with amenities like new public art and a work out area. The Oak Knoll Park trail now winds through the fourteen acre stand of mature trees and past the iconic pond and fountain.

"Our citizens told us in the recent citizen satisfaction survey that the trails are important," said Parks and Recreation Directory Patty DeForrest. "It is our goal to continue to improve and expand our existing trail system."

To facilitate connection to city parks and trails, a number of community projects have been completed. Wydown Boulevard, designated as one of the Top 10 Great Streets in 2010 by the American Planning Association, has bike lanes, sidewalks, and a jogging trail in the center median for safe, leisurely strolls and recreational travel from Forest Park to Downtown Clayton.

Downtown Clayton, being the center of a bustling business community, teems with vehicular and pedestrian traffic. In 2013, the city adopted C the Future, a long range strategic plan that recommends making the busy streets more pedestrian friendly. This process has become part

of the city's Complete Streets program which focuses on a transportation system that supports safe use of the roadway for everyone. A prime example of a complete street is The Crescent section of Carondelet Plaza near the Ritz-Carlton where automobiles and bicycles comfortably share the roadway while pedestrians are given ample room to walk.

West of downtown, Shaw Park connects with the new Centennial Greenway, a part of the regional Great River's Greenway trail system that continues north to Olive Boulevard. Cyclists and walkers can also travel through the south end of Shaw Park and into the Clayshire neighborhood for safer access to retail along Clayton Road and Brentwood Boulevard.
