Twenty years ago, your Board of Aldermen passed a "term limit" ordinance that set the maximum time the mayor and members of the Board of Aldermen could serve; no more than three, three-year terms or nine consecutive years for aldermen, and two, three-year terms or six consecutive years for the mayor.

With the municipal election on April 7, Michelle Harris, one of our most outstanding aldermen, will retire after serving the maximum nine years in office. She is energetic, hard driving and always thinking. She is a dedicated servant of the people of Ward 2 and of the entire City of Clayton. Equipped with both a determined attitude about what needs to get done, and a great sense of humor, Michelle has been the lead player on many issues that have positively affected our community. As Mayor Pro Tempore, she has honorably and effectively represented our community in regional issues. The Board of Aldermen will clearly miss her advice and input. Having had the pleasure of serving with Michelle for the past two years, I too will miss her good counsel. Thank you, Michelle, for your service.

On April 7, you will have the opportunity to elect individuals to the Aldermanic positions open in each of our three wards. A Candidate Forum sponsored by the Clayton Chamber of Commerce and produced by the members of the Mayor's Youth Advisory Council (MYAC) was held on March 23 at Clayton High School. Since the aldermen represent your voice in city government, I hope you were able to attend the forum and learn more about what each of the candidates represent. I encourage you to vote on April 7.

With spring at our door step, your elected officials and city staff have created a very busy schedule of events. See details on Page 7 of this newsletter, and on the city's website www.claytonmo.gov. I hope you will join your neighbors and enjoy food, fun and adventure.

Ward II is usually pretty quiet but we are looking at some potential changes. Claverach Park will be considering whether to request that the City enact design standards for new homes. Residents, and then the City, will have to decide whether such standards would be of benefit in maintaining the character of this beautiful and stately neighborhood. And in the Moorlands, the City has enacted temporary parking restrictions in the 7400 blocks. Overnight street parking without a city-issued permit is now prohibited. The Board of Aldermen will decide at some point in the near future whether to make the restrictions permanent.

In April, we will bid a fond farewell to Michelle Harris who will, due to term limits, step down as Ward II Alderman. Michelle will have served on the Board of Aldermen for 9 years and as senior alderman on the Board for 3 years. The community has benefited and will continue to benefit well into the future from Michelle's service on the Board. During her tenure she helped to found the Clayton Century Foundation (CCF) and was the catalyst for or a major proponent of several important initiatives including formation of the domestic partner registry, establishment of an economic developer position in city government, and enactment of a "sweat free" procurement ordinance requiring the city to consider before purchase whether items were manufactured in sweatshops or by child labor. Michelle has been an active member of several City commissions and committees including CCF, the Parks and Recreation Commission, Municipal League, Ice Rink Task Force, Clayton Recreation, Sports and Wellness Commission, C the Future and the former Clayton Arts Commission.

Michelle has been an inspirational leader of and a true powerhouse figure on your Board of Aldermen and will be deeply missed. Michelle moves on to other pursuits including the Zoo-Museum District Board of Directors where she will help to oversee our regional cultural assets. Thank you for your service to Clayton, Michelle – we wish you well!

2015 Municipal Election

On Tuesday, April 7, 2015, the City of Clayton will hold a municipal election for the offices of Alderman in Ward 1, Alderman in Ward II and Alderman in Ward III, each for a three-year term.

Persons interested in running for the office of Alderman are required to file a Declaration of Candidacy form. The filing period began on Tuesday, December 16, 2014 at 8 a.m. and ended on Tuesday, January 20, 2015 at 5 p.m.

Candidates must be registered to vote, at least 25 years of age, and have lived in the City of Clayton for at least two years prior to the election date.

NEWS from the Clayton Century Foundation (CCF)

Working with the City of Clayton in a public-private partnership, the CCF is pleased to help further the vitality of the city in its second century and support Clayton's role as the seat of St. Louis County government and a regional leader.

To date, much has been accomplished. Multiple CCF-funded projects in Shaw Park are being enjoyed by residents, workers and visitors. The new Oak Knoll Park playground features two CCF benches, and the CCF has a great line-up planned for Musical Nights concerts this summer. Restoration continues at the historic Hanley House in the enhanced Hanley Park, both of which are visited by a record-breaking number of guests. The newly created Anderson Park is a popular gathering place for dogs and their owners. The CCF helped to support Shakespeare in the Streets, bringing 1,500 theater-goers to downtown Clayton for three summer nights. The CCF book *Clayton, Missouri – An Urban Story* receives continuing orders, and historical exhibits can be viewed at Commerce Bank and the St. Louis County Library.

Because of caring, generous business and residential donors, CCF continues to fulfill its mission to stimulate private investment for cultural assets and social opportunities through Arts, Parks, History and Sustainability.

To date, by the numbers:

- \$2,000,000+ donated to fund City enhancements
- 91 cents of every dollar dedicated to priority projects
- 24+ projects funded
- 650+ fans receive CCF e-newsletter
- 800+ history books sold

More is on the horizon. The Generations Project encourages participation of long-time families and businesses as tributes and memorials to loved ones and founders. The Clayton Heritage Center is planned for the Center of Clayton to preserve community stories, display historical items and encourage research. In 2015, CCF is committed to engage new volunteers, cultivate new donors and identify new projects that have high value to the community.

Economic Development

(Clayton's vacancy rates are consistently among the lowest in the metropolitan area.)

- Welcomed fifteen new retail businesses and a new hotel.
- Recorded an increase in sales tax per square foot of commercial space.
- Recorded a decrease in commercial property tax per square foot.

Finance Department

- For twenty-seven consecutive years, was awarded the Certificate of Achievement for Excellence in Financial Reporting for its Comprehensive Annual Financial Report (CAFR).
- Was awarded the Distinguished Budget Presentation Award (DBPA) for the seventh year in a row, and received a Special Performance Measures Recognition for its FY2014 budget.
- Received the International City/County Management Association (ICMA) Center for Performance Measurement's Certificate of Excellence for the fourth consecutive year. Clayton is one of only 29 jurisdictions receiving this award in 2014.

Fire Department

(The Clayton Fire Department offers free fire safety home inspections to all residents. To schedule an inspection, call Kathy at 314.290.8485.)

- During Fire Prevention Week, personnel wearing full firefighting gear presented fire prevention videos and books to 11 Clayton grade schools and spoke with over 580 children and teachers.
- Participated in the Operational Readiness Exercise. The disaster exercise simulates an earthquake, and participating firefighters worked in collapsed structures and removed and treated victims.
- Personnel, who serve on the St. Louis County Heavy Rescue Taskforce, participated in a drill that helps to improve the department's ability to respond to disasters.
- Trained in the Multi-Assault Counter-Terrorism Action Capabilities (MACTAC) rescue method, which enables personnel to immediately deploy a contact team or squad to locate, move to and neutralize violent assaults and/or terrorist acts with assistance from law enforcement.
- Worked with Clayton, county and other local police departments on expanding the Fire Department's role in Multi-Assault Counter-Terrorism Action Capabilities (MACTAC) to provide rapid patient care during active shooter events. This unique partnership helps protect fire personnel in high risk or uncontrolled events, and serves as a model for other groups around the nation.

- Held high angle rope rescue training. The department was granted permission by Centene to conduct the training off the Centene parking garage. The department hosted the training for members of St. Louis Metro Strike Team 3 Urban Search and Rescue team which includes members of many departments and districts from St. Louis County.

Parks and Recreation Department

- Opened the new Great Rivers Greenway trailhead in Shaw Park with a bike ride event in May.
- Buried the Centennial Time Capsule in Hanley Park as part of the combined Clayton Community Day and Hanley Herb Sale.
- Completed the Enterprise Pavilion.
- Renovated Shaw Park Fields 3 and 4 with new grading, turf and irrigation.
- Held the first Food Truck Sundays events in Shaw Park on the second Sundays of June, July and August.
- Partnered with Big Shark Cycling for the first Clayton Kids Triathlon in Shaw Park. The event gathered 143 participants, exceeding expectations for a new competition.
- Renovated the playground at Oak Knoll Park with half of the funding secured through a St. Louis County Municipal Park Grant, and the remaining provided jointly by the City of Clayton and The Clayton Early Childhood Center which resides in the park.
- Shaw Park and Hanley Park were selected as landmark sites by stl250. Each park served as host for an iconic *Cakeway to the West* sculpture.

Planning and Development Services

- Increased transparency through the creation of two new web-based resources. The new user friendly one-stop-shop for zoning information can be found at www.claytonmo.gov/zoning. To track new development, visit www.claytonmo.gov/pendingapplications
- Drafted regulations to increase the number of high-quality bicycle parking opportunities throughout the city.
- Initiated a two-year pilot program, which temporarily and selectively suspends strict enforcement of the city's temporary sign regulations and permits the display of otherwise prohibited temporary signs, banners, advertising and other temporary attention-getting devices in association with special events conducted by retail businesses.
- Issued 1,429 construction permits, which represents \$91,212,322 in construction valuation.

Police Department

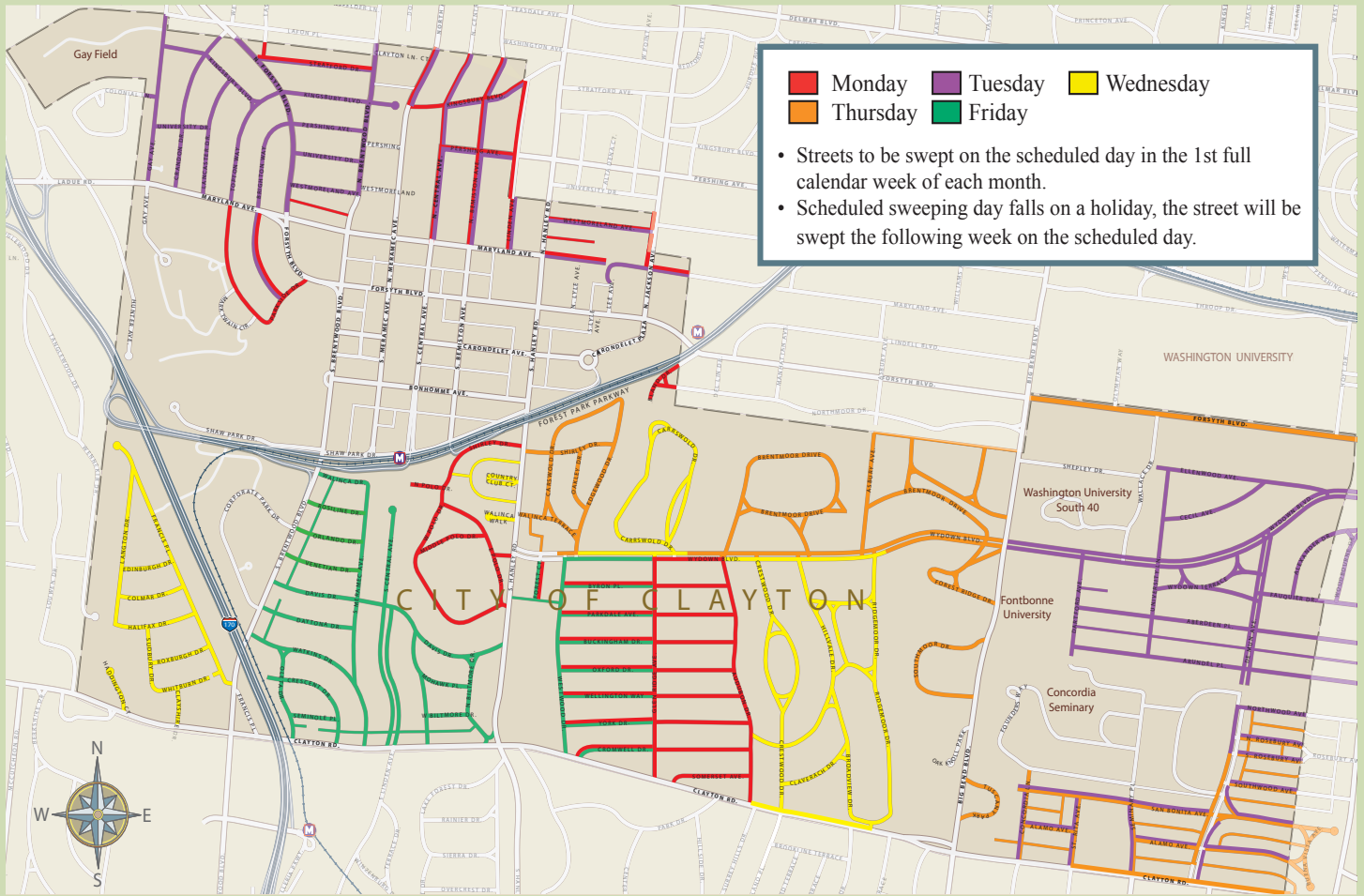
- (Among local and national peer cities, Clayton consistently provides exceptional levels of police service at the lowest average cost per capita.)
- Using bar code technology, implemented a new evidence management system.
 - Received letters from fifteen Clayton citizens commending the department on its outstanding work in preparing for planned and spontaneous demonstrations and protests during the summer 2014.
 - Ranked in the top third in the state in the Safewise "50 Safest Cities in Missouri."

Public Works Department

- Completed the Pedestrian Enhancement Project to expand the Downtown Streetscape. Valued at \$1.5M, 80% funded by a federal grant.
- Completed two construction projects, both 80% funded by federal grants: the Brentwood/Carondelet Streetscape Project to expand the Downtown Streetscape, and the Wydown Boulevard Resurfacing Project to improve the pavement condition and provide enhanced multimodal access.
- Completed the Claverach Park Resurfacing Project using \$572,000 from new bonds approved by voters in April.
- Completed Alley Repairs project totaling \$580,000.
- Upgraded seven curb ramps on DeMun Avenue to ADA standards through the use of \$22,000 in Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funding.
- Replaced over 6,100 square feet of public sidewalks through the annual Sidewalk Replacement program.
- Extended the life of just under 50 lane miles of roadways through crack sealing as part of the Public Works' Pavement Management Program.
- Received LEED (Leadership in Energy & Environmental Design) Platinum Certification for the renovation of the new Police Station at 10 S. Brentwood Boulevard. LEED is a green building certification program that recognizes best-in-class building strategies and practices.
- Recognized as a Tree City USA for the 22nd consecutive year.
- Received the Tree City USA Growth Award for the sixth time having demonstrated improvement in or implementation of new forestry programs.

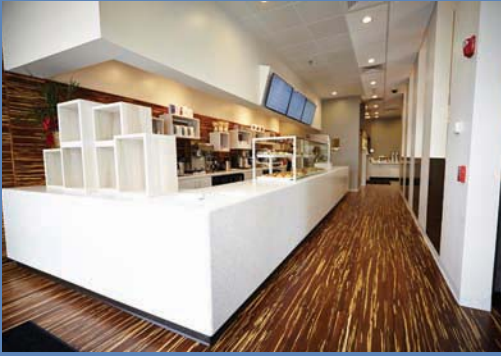

Shaw Park North Entry Project

Enhancements to Shaw Park's northern corner will be considered this year, and the process will begin with a series of public engagement forums. The project will serve to connect Clayton's vibrant and growing downtown community with the park by adding a welcoming entry plaza and connecting trail at the corner of Brentwood and Forsyth. The plan also outlines a cascading waterfall garden and pond. The project originally appeared in the Shaw Park Master Plan Overlay in 2013 and will be funded by a private donation through the Clayton Century Foundation. Residents will be invited to public forums about the project in the coming months.



Grant Received to Help Improve Recycling in City Parks

The city, in cooperation with our waste hauler, Republic Services, recently applied for and received a grant for \$15,000 to secure single stream recycling containers for the city's parks. This grant is offered through the St. Louis – Jefferson Solid Waste Management program and will provide funding to purchase 24 containers that will be distributed throughout the city's eleven parks. With the amount of trash that is generated in all of our parks and at our recreation facilities we see this as an opportunity to reduce waste that is going into our landfills and help to ensure that recyclable materials are getting to local recycling centers. Residents can help in this effort by making sure they take the time to separate their trash and put recyclable materials only in the recycling containers while visiting our parks.
