



Help Prevent Car Theft

The Clayton Police Department needs your help. In 2015 alone, over 200 cars were broken into, and two-thirds of them were unlocked.

During an investigation into numerous vehicle larcenies in the area, one juvenile admitted that he and a group of friends often target Clayton because they "always" locate unlocked vehicles with valuable items in plain sight. The young man stated that the group travels from Illinois to Clayton, where they simply pull on car handles to identify unlocked automobiles. Based on numerous investigations, it appears that criminals identify Clayton as an easy target.

The Police Department's goal is to significantly reduce, if not eliminate, these targeted larcenies. In addition to protecting the safety of our citizens and their personal property, a few simple steps will help to significantly reduce the cost of easily preventable investigations. Typical car break-in investigations cost the City roughly \$425 per incident – a cost that can be eliminated by simply locking your car door and removing valuables!

- If you hear GLASS BREAK or see suspicious activity, call 911.
- If you must leave your belongings in the car, remember to HIDE them.
- Always LOCK your car, even in your driveway, and TAKE your keys.
- Never leave your car running unattended or your keys in the ignition.
- If you have a garage, use it.

8125 Forsyth



8125 FORSYTH

On December 7, Apogee Associates LLC, of Saint Louis, presented a conceptual design to the Planning Commission/ Architectural Review Board. The proposed project, located at 8125 Forsyth, would replace the vacant 2 story office/retail space with a 14-story Class A office building. The estimated cost of the project's construction is \$68.5 million.

After conceptual review by the Planning Commission/Architectural Review Board, the developer may submit plans for the redevelopment of the property and City staff will go through a detailed review of the proposal. The proposed project would be developed as a Special Development District (SDD) and would require public hearings before the Plan Commission / Architectural Review Board and Board of Aldermen.

7501 MARYLAND AVENUE

On December 23, 2015, Maryland School Town Homes LLC submitted an application to the Planning Department for a Planned Unit Development. The project has been reduced from 36 to 25 townhomes by eliminating the proposed buildings along Westmoreland. The project otherwise remains the same as previously proposed. Planning staff expect this project to appear before the Plan Commission sometime in mid-February or early March.

Electronic Recycling is held on the south parking lot in Shaw Park for residents and business employees to dispose of unwanted electronics in an environmentally safe way.



Planning and Development

Tree Preservation & Replacement

City planners are in the process of updating the City's tree and landscaping requirements. The new requirements will apply to new residential construction, large residential additions, and large non-residential developments located in residential zoning districts. The purpose of the new regulations is to provide standards for the protection, preservation and replacement of trees; to reduce



tree loss and damage during construction; to promote tree species diversity; and to maintain adequate tree canopy coverage citywide. The City will host a public workshop in February to give the community an opportunity to provide input on the proposed regulations.
