

City Implements Emergency Notification System

In a continuing effort to improve communication with residents and businesses during emergency situations, the City has contracted with CodeRED, an emergency notification system that allows for public safety personnel to quickly deliver emergency alerts. CodeRED will serve as the backbone of the City's emergency planning and communications outreach for those who live, work, and do business in the community, including city personnel. The system enables the City to send important alerts with phone calls, text messages, emails, and social media posts as well as broadcasts through the CodeRED mobile alert app. The City expects to use the system to notify residents in specific areas of police emergencies, hazardous



conditions, road maintenance, missing children notices, and other critical information.

CodeRED has provided the City with an initial database of residential and business telephone numbers; however, all residents are encouraged to visit claytonmo.gov/codered and click on the CodeRED logo to add additional contact information including cell phone numbers, text and email addresses.

No one should assume they have been automatically added to the emergency contact database.

SIGN UP TO RECEIVE WEATHER WARNINGS

With CodeRed Weather Warnings, whenever the National Weather Service issues a severe thunderstorm, tornado or flash flood warning and the geographically based CodeRed system determines that your address is in the path of the storm, you will receive an immediate call with warning information. Due to the accuracy of this system, you will not receive calls for weather warnings outside the path of the address you register.

Help Fight the Bite this Summer -



Mosquitoes are an all-too-familiar summer nuisance. They also pose a potential health threat, as some species transmit mosquito-borne diseases. We need your help to control mosquito breeding in Clayton this summer.

The number of mosquitoes around residences and businesses can

be reduced significantly by minimizing the amount of standing water available for mosquito breeding. Some mosquitoes lay their eggs in standing water where they hatch in a day or two. Other mosquitoes lay their eggs in bird baths, pools, or other water-holding containers where they may remain unhatched for weeks or months until they are covered with water. **Mosquitoes can develop in any standing water that is present for more than five days.** Together we can work to eliminate standing water and fight the bite!

TO HELP CONTROL MOSQUITO BREEDING:

- Drain all areas of standing water.
- Change water in wading pools, pet dishes and birdbaths several times a week.
- · Keep backyard pools clean.
- Keep unnecessary plant growth cut back.
- Cover trash can containers so they will not collect water.
- Use automatic sprinkler systems wisely. Make sure systems are checked to avoid leaving standing water.
- Clean or replace clogged roof gutters and downspouts.

TO PROTECT YOURSELF AND FAMILY MEMBERS:

- While outside during dawn and dusk hours wear long, loose and light-colored clothing.
- Use insect repellents that contain DEET.

The City contracts with St. Louis County Vector control for mosquito spraying, which typically occurs once a week on Thursdays beginning at sunset.

Taylor Park Renovation

A big transformation will be happening at Taylor Park this summer. The playground is scheduled to be replaced this year as part of the Parks and Recreation Department's Master Plan. To that end, local park neighbors, City staff, and consultants met in the summer and fall of 2015 and created an interesting and accessible playground design that will delight local children for the coming years. The new playground will include shade structures, ramps, swings and slides among other great features.

Construction of any kind also creates wear and tear on the surrounding area. This challenge created a great opportunity to invest in enhancements to the park as a whole. As part of the project, the City will also be upgrading landscaping, turf and irrigation and replacing old picnic tables and benches. A new sidewalk will be added to provide easy access to those



entering from Bemiston. The Clayton Century Foundation helped raise funds so that the project could be expanded to include an entire park renovation rather than simply a playground replacement.

Construction began on May 16th with completion expected by the end of July. The project was funded by a \$382,000 St. Louis County Municipal Park Grant,

\$28,000 of City funds and a \$10,000 Clayton Century Foundation donation.


As part of the City's pavement maintenance program, several subdivisions will be resurfaced this summer: Clayton Gardens, Country Club Ct./Place, Clayshire, West Bemiston, and Parkside (see map). Construction is scheduled to begin in early June and will be completed by October.

Other infrastructure improvements taking place this summer include:

- Alleys will be reconstructed in the Central Business District and Davis Place.
- Sidewalk repairs and roadway crack sealing is currently underway.
- The annual curb ramp project will address select non-compliant ADA ramps in the Central Business District.

Public Works will notify affected subdivision residents by mail prior to the start of each street resurfacing project. Letters will contain a link to the City's website with a complete project schedule, as well as information about street accessibility.

Continued Replacement of Aging Water Mains



Missouri American Water Company (MOAW) is continuing to replace aging water mains throughout the City in the Clayshire, Clayton Gardens, Parkside, and Country Club Ct./ Place neighborhoods in advance of the City's Resurfacing

Project this summer. Hillcrest is also scheduled to have water mains replaced with work anticipated to begin the coming weeks.

During construction of the new water main and/or during the service line taps, property owners may experience temporary interruptions in water service. MOAW should provide notification to residents in advance of such interruptions.

Water main replacements generally involve the following order of work:

- Water main installation (usually in the street).
- Residential/business service line taps to new water main (in area behind curb).
- Restoration of the pavement and areas disturbed by constructon.
