Home Maintenance

In order to keep our community beautiful and property values strong, many decades ago the city established minimum standards for all commercial and residential structures. These property maintenance codes are from an international standard and common to most all US Cities. Our inspectors work with property owners, both proactively and in response to complaints, to ensure these basic codes are maintained for everyone, which in turn, helps all neighbors enjoy the beauty of our special neighborhoods. Our intent is always to help point out concerns that can be overlooked by even the most meticulous homeowner and work with them on a plan to get them in compliance.

Now is a good time to take a look at your property. Here is a list of the most common things we see and things that can also protect you from more costly repairs in the future:



- Clean gutters and downspouts. Clogged gutters and downspouts can cause the wood trim at the eaves to rot, and that can invite critters into your attic space. Having your gutters and downspouts cleaned early in the season can help prevent damage from heavy rains.
- 2. Reseal exterior woodwork and make repairs. Wood decks, fences, railings, trellises, pergolas and other outdoor structures will last longer and stay in better condition if they're stained or resealed every year or two.
- **3. Check for signs of termites.** Especially during summer months, be on the lookout for these winged insects.
- 4. Inspect roof. Start by making a simple visual inspection of your roof. Use your smartphone camera or binoculars to find problems without climbing onto your roof. If you notice anything that needs closer inspection or repair, call a roofer.

- **5. Paint exterior.** Summer and fall are good times to repaint the exterior of your home, if necessary.
- 6. Inspect driveways and paths. Take a walk around your property to look for damage to walkways, paths and driveways, and schedule repairs as needed.
- 7. Prevent mosquitoes. The best way to prevent mosquitos around your home is simply by getting rid of any standing water. Walk around your property to look for any area where water stands. Once located, fix it, get rid of it, or maintain it regularly.
- 8. Check screen doors and windows. Screens are designed to let the breeze flow in and keep bugs out but they can only do their job if they're free from holes and tears. Before setting up your screens for the months ahead, be sure to carefully check each one and repair any damage, no matter how small.

Among the many wonderful benefits that Clayton enjoys, safe residential and commercial areas top the list. The great work of our public safety officials is beyond compare and they do an exemplary job of keeping us safe. However, Clayton is not immune to the attempts of those who wish to prey on our community. Our entire region, including

Clayton, has been subject to an epidemic of car break-ins. The fact is that when apprehended, our officers have been told by the perpetrators that they specifically come to Clayton because so many cars are left unlocked. Between January 1 and the middle of June this year, 38 car break-ins were reported to the police. That alone is an eye-opening number, but the real headline is that of those 38, as many as 35 vehicles had been left unlocked and more than half of the cars stolen had the keys left in them.

There is one easy and simple step that we as citizens can do to reduce the success of those who have taken the criminal road. If you LOVE IT, *LOCK IT*. If the people who try to prey on unlocked cars and homes find no easy access to their targets, it will discourage them from trying, and give them no reason to visit us. In addition, if you have active video that covers the street in front of your home, sign up to participate in our Community Camera Program by calling (314) 290-8406 or visiting www.claytonmo.gov/communitycameras. If a crime is committed in your neighborhood, you might have recorded evidence important to solving the case. Signing up for the Community Camera Program does not give the Clayton Police Department access to your cameras or its recordings, but allows officers to contact you should a crime occur in or near the area where the cameras are installed.

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Construction on the three new apartment developments is just about complete and leasing is actively underway. As we anxiously await the arrival of the newest residents of Clayton, think about how you would like to be welcomed and extend that welcoming hand to people you may meet. These new residents will be great additions to our community.

Board of Aldermen to Consider Fiscal Year 2018 Budget



During the first week of July, City Manager Craig Owens proposed the Fiscal Year 2018 budget for the City of Clayton to the Board of Aldermen. The proposed budget includes a one year operating budget plus two additional planning years for all funds as well as a five year Capital Improvement Plan. As proposed, the budget achieves a balanced General Fund budget, continuing this achievement from the prior years. The budget is guided by the principles of maintaining high service levels, responsiveness to the needs of residents and businesses, preservation of long-term financial stability through sound fiscal management, and well-planned capital investment to preserve infrastructure and public facilities.

Residents are encouraged to attend the August 22 Board of Aldermen meeting where the budget will be considered and a public hearing will be held.

Wayfinding Signage Installed in Clayton

If you've been walking or driving around Clayton lately, you've probably noticed the new wayfinding signs. This project was identified as an initiative in the 2010 Downtown Master Plan with the goal of providing clear messaging to Downtown Clayton visitors. In 2015, a competitive project bid was awarded to Kiku Obata & Company, a design company specializing in identity and wayfinding design, particularly for public institutions, cities and urban spaces. The signage was recently installed by Color-Ad and includes both pedestrian and vehicular guide signage along with visitor kiosks throughout Downtown Clayton that will make navigation easier and highlight attractions and destinations in an appealing and informative manner.
