

Clayton Appoints New City Manager, David Gipson

The Clayton Board of Aldermen has appointed David Gipson to serve as City Manager, effective February 3, 2020.

Gipson has substantial experience in public service and professional city management. He served most recently as City Administrator for the City of Wentzville, Missouri since



2016, where he led a full- and part-time staff of nearly 500 employees. Prior to this he served as Assistant City Manager in the City of Richmond Heights and other positions in the City of St. Charles. He earned a Master's degree in Public Policy Administration at University of Missouri – St. Louis, and a Bachelor of Science degree in Planning from Missouri State University. Mr. Gipson's prior experience as a professional city planner will be particularly beneficial to the city in regard to redevelopment and the upcoming comprehensive planning process.

"I am honored that the Mayor and Board of Aldermen have entrusted me to serve as Clayton's next city manager," incoming City Manager Gipson said. "Clayton is a unique community with engaged residents, flourishing neighborhoods, a thriving business sector and a substantial public sector as the seat of St. Louis County Government. I look forward to joining the community and working with the City's elected officials, management team and staff to deliver high quality services."

The City initiated a national executive search in mid-2019 to identify the City's next city manager. After receiving numerous nationwide applications, the Board of Aldermen spent significant time reviewing applications and performing interviews prior to selecting Gipson. As City Manager, he will lead a professional staff of nearly 400 full- and part-time employees, all working to provide world-class public services for Clayton's 16,000 residents and daytime population of 47,000.

"As a new mayor, I'm looking forward to working with David as our new City Manager," said Mayor Michelle Harris. "Together with the Board of Aldermen, our outstanding staff and the people of Clayton, David will help lead us into a new decade. With this critical leadership role in place, we can continue the work of creating the community we want for the future."

David and his wife, Kerry, will reside is Clayton with their 3 children.

FBI National Academy

On Friday, December 20, Lt. Al Thuet of the Clayton PD graduated from the FBI National Academy in Quantico, VA. The FBINA is a leadership training program that began in 1935



with the purpose of increasing standardization and professionalism in law enforcement. Today, the 10-week program trains 220 officers each quarter of the year, including 20 officers from foreign countries. Only eight officers from Eastern Missouri are selected for the FBINA each year, so it's an honor for Lt. Thuet to be chosen for this program. Lt. Thuet received training on leadership concepts, media relations, health and wellness, and emerging technologies.

The FBINA experience was capped off with the tradition of running the Yellow Brick Road. The Yellow Brick Road is a 6.1-mile obstacle course/run on Marine Corps Base Quantico. Lt. Thuet received a yellow brick with his FBINA session number to commemorate the achievement.

Looking Back: We ended 2019 hearing from many of you, in and beyond Ward II. One of the last proposals on year-end Board agendas was development of the City parking lot located at Wydown and Hanley. Conversations were difficult, yet they resulted in bringing sharper focus to our City, and to our Ward II neighborhood values and priorities.

Looking Forward: This Spring the Board will begin work on the City's Comprehensive Plan. Maryland Park Moves Forward

Final conceptual designs for Clayton's newest park at 7811 Maryland Avenue have been created by the landscape architects at SWT Design. Plans include a bike station near the new bike lane, a small water feature, seating and plenty of plants to create a relaxing oasis from the bustle of downtown. Partial funding for construction has been secured by the



Clayton Community Foundation (CCF) through a \$50,000 grant from the Opus Foundation. CCF is seeking additional funding to bring this project to life in 2020. The park is expected to break ground this year and be completed in 2021 in conjunction with the repaying of Maryland Avenue.
